Item 7^d I give unto my Daughter Sally Ruth for a one hundred dollars item
I give unto my son Jeremiah my negro man Jacob and my negro girl Betty
also one feather bed a set furniture one box and half choice of my Stock
one pair of high the plough & gear with which he works & one long together with
the whole of the crop now growing or of his yearly production after his dying
he rents I should my wife Mary Woodard survive me I wish her to live
with my son Jeremiah and to enable him to take good care of her & to
provide what she may stand necessities in need of I will & desire that
the whole of my property be kept together and remain in possession of my
son Jeremiah until the death of my said wife Mary Woodard and
a reward to my said son Jeremiah I give the use of the labour of the negro
and her increase together with the use and increase of my money & chattels
during the life of my said wife and it is my desire that my executors see
that my son Jeremiah perform his duty in this respect and if in their
opinion he does not then and in that case I desire & request of my executors
to take my estate into their hands and hire it out for the purpose of pro-
viding for and taking care of my said wife Mary Woodard during her
life. If at the death of my wife Mary Woodard I will & desire that my executors
(or either of them) see the provisions of this my will to come into effect and
not sooner by giving and delivering over to each child what is herein
bequeath them I wish that half of my estate not her undivided share of and
the remaining equally divided between my son Jeremiah & my daugh-
ter Sally Fitz I do hereby appoint my friends Robert & Foster & James
Whitsett my true & lawful executors to this my last will and Testament

This Fourteenth day of August 1808 between John W. Clay of the County
of Davidson & State of North Carolina of the first part and Clark Sanford
of Williamson County & State of Georgia of the second part and black servant
surviving partner of the late firm of Cole & Clay of the said late firm
of Clay & Cole, whereas the said John W. Clay Esq. was indebted to the said late firm
of Cole & Clay & did upon a bond bearing date the 19th of May 1803 for one
hundred & forty two pounds ten shillings & pence halfpenny and having
already conveyed a negro man by the name of Primus to Dr. Bryan of New
Georgia in trust for security of said debt and being willing to better secure
the payment of the same debt by these presents to convey to said Dr. Bryan his
husband in trust a negro woman named Child Small & a waggon & four horses
