I live on Bogeying all the birth east corner and running west fifty seven and a half pole North North a hundred and thirty nine and a half pole being paying twenty dollars for the purchase of a warrant for the mill seat item five and bequeath to my son Lewis fifty acres of land to live North west boundary and running also fifty seven and a half pole North North 139 pole and his man and cattle item five and bequeath to my wife my black horse two years old two cows white face and black and one calf and furniture and the bed she brought with her and one half of the house held for fixtures and one half of the cleared ground, while she remains my widow the movable property to descend to the two children I had by her item five and bequeath to my son Lewis one hundred acres of land In New London with all the farming utensils and the stock that is not already devised him paying the debts of the estate the same and give Hannah Sarah Mary Skaggs. Fifty dollars a year each when they can obtain use of the stock. All the provision that is now on the plantation for the use of the family until fall. To say little William and school him and pay him one hundred dollars when he comes of age. Lewis is to live with him and have privilege to take provision for himself & debts until he comes of age, him to collect the debts and the balance of the house hold furniture that is not devised to be his signed sealed in the presence of us this fifth day of November 1809
