Elas Mary Peppers being sworn states:

I was acquainted with Est Hall deceased with one half mile of his last residence was sent for to visit him at his residence on Friday night July 24 1868. I found him near death he layed almost one half hour after I arrived there he told me that he was going to die that he was sensible of that fact & that he was sorry of one thing that he had not sent for the Emcks & had his will wrote out as he had intended to do but that he wanted every thing in the place to go to his wife Rachael after his just debts was paid that he intended for her to have every thing & turned to his son Joshua & repeated it again that he did not want one thing taken off of the place that after his just debts was paid he wanted Rachael to have every thing left & he called upon me to witness that to be his last will & Testament."
