any exist be paid. 4th I give unto my beloved niece
Geraldine Eberly for her sole and separate use comfort and
maintenance forever free from the control or claims of
her husband or of any person or persons having any
part thereof through or by him the remainder one third
of my estate of every kind and description both real and
personal left after paying my debts if any (exist)
be paid. Lastly I Will that my Wives third share
named lawfully divided my said estate among them-
selves and do hereby nominate and appoint them the
said Henry C. Vaughan Margaret E. Vaughan and Geraldine
Eberly or either one of them my Executors of this my
last Will and Testament pursuing all others they are therefore
made both witness and seal. So Testifying and
confirming this my last Will and Testament. In Witness
whereof I have hereunto set my name and affix my
seal this Aug 4th One thousand Eight hundred and Seventy
four.

John A. Burtis
deed

I John A. Burtis being of sound mind and disposing memory do make and publish this as my last will and testament: First It is my desire that all my Just debts be paid and for that purpose my Executor hereafter appointed in a balance of sufficiency of money for that purpose shall dispose of the sufficient amount of my personal property to discharge such indebtedness. Second: It is my desire that all my property both real and personal together with all the notes and accounts which may be due my estate after discharging my indebtedness as herein before provided shall belong to my wife Elizabeth Burtis for and during her natural life and she is hereby authorized in conjunction with my Executor herein appointed to see and dispose of any part of my present estate for the support maintenance and education of my children and for this purpose my said wife and my said Executor hereafter appointed or either of them are authorized to make such sale for the purposes aforesaid when it is deemed necessary in their discretion. Third It is my desire that my said wife Elizabeth shall have a comfortable support for herself and she is authorized to take any part or all of my personal property if necessary to secure her comfortable support and maintenance of herself after the death of my said wife Elizabeth. It is my desire that all my property both real and personal shall go to my children equally as though I had died intestate. Sixth I hereby nominate and appoint Patrick & Roscoe Burtis my eldest Son Executor of this my last will and testament and as such he will not be required to give the usual Bond: acknowledged and published in our presence and were at his request and in the presence of each other.
