

In the name of God Amen: I James Kiss in my right mind and perfect
sense do declare this to be my last will and Testament do dispose of my
estate in the following manner First I give and bequeath to my Daughter
Betsey A one negro Girl named Betty One bed and furniture One Case
one more and saddle and Bridle the use of said more saddle
and bridle to go to the use of his mother when necessary call for
the same and said negro to ^{be kept} in the family to help raise them
and if said negro should to him increase I also wish my oldest son
Alfred A Kiss to have the first and one horse saddle and bridle and
Saddles with my son William Jefferson to have the second one and one horse
saddle and bridle and I do also wish my Daughter Louise to have the
third and one horse saddle and bridle and one bed and furniture
Cane and case. And I also give and bequeath to my wife Nancy
Kiss two beds and furniture two cows six of my best hogs two breeding
sows six of her choice of sheep and all the grain and the produce of
my estate (viz) my tract of land farming utensils household
and Kitchen furniture also my stock of cattle and hogs and sheep
and horses above my wife Nancy Kiss during her natural life
or widowhood and if she remains single all of said property
to be sold at a twelve months credit and equally divided among
my children Betsey A Alfred K Kissians I and Louise Kiss
if she remains my widow until death then the property to
be equally divided among my children Betsey A Alfred K
Kissians I and Louise Kiss I further direct that my Brother
William Kiss come and live on my plantation and have the
care of the same by giving a reasonable rent the rent to go to the
support of of raising my family and schooling them I also order
and direct that John Cassedy Kiss Nancy Kiss (my wife) to be
my Executors I am under my hand and Seal this 8th of November 1825
