

N. H. Garner & M. H. Garner of Trautman County Tennessee do hereby make &
 publish my last Will & Testament revoking all others by me
 at any time heretofore made & true all my property of every
 kind and description real personal mixed & except my slaves
 I give to my Wife absolutely to use and control thereof of
 in any way she may choose. I true 2^d all my slaves I
 give to my Wife during her life at her death I give them
 to my father & mother for the survivors of them. If they are
 both dead at the death of my Wife I give all my negroes
 to my Brothers & Sisters to be equally divided between them
 if any of my Brothers & Sisters are dead leaving issue such
 issue to occupy the place of the parents in the division
 I true 3^d if my Wife desires it or my Executors think it
 advisable I direct them to sell my negro girl Frances
 with the proceeds to purchase another to her & to stand in
 place & to stand in the same condition as the other
 slaves devised. I empower my Executors to make such
 sale & purchase without any order of Court as freely if
 they award said negroes & to pay to her father & mother or the
 survivors if they are dead to her Brothers & Sisters five
 hundred dollars this being the amount received by me
 from her father that part of my property given to my
 Wife absolutely is to be charged with the payment of the
 five hundred dollars but should there not be a sufficient
 property to pay this amount without it I direct my
 negroes or such as many of them as may be necessary
 be hired until the amount is raised I true & constitute
 constitute my appoint my father L. H. Garner & my Brother
 in Law A. Estee Executors of this Will. In testimony
 whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal June
