 Franklin County, do hereby certify that I am of legal age and of sound
 perfect mind and knowing the mortality of the Body do make a
 and declare this my last will and testament and part of all
 I am concerned my soul to the Almighty God who gave it and
 my body to the earth from whence it was taken to be
 buried in a decent and Christian like manner at the discretion
 of my Executors whom I nominate and appoint (viz) my wife
 Elizabeth and Robert Lacey also my beloved friend John N.
 Cullum Executors of all. This my will that all my
 lawful debts should be paid and then it is my will that my
 well beloved wife Elizabeth shall have the said sum of
 five hundred and twenty five dollars and one negro
 woman named Liza also one negro man named Bob also
 one mare and two cows and calves also what logs belong to
 place. Also all the beds and furniture that belongs to the house
 also all the household and kitchen furniture during her natural
 life or widowhood and then she shall be allowed to have my beloved
 son Robert by his paying all my beloved daughters one hundred
 dollars apiece negro Bob and the rest of the property at the death of
 my beloved wife is to be sold and equally divided amongst my
 son and daughters except Liza who is to be kept in the family
 either by sale or hire. It is also my will that all the property that is
 not mentioned in the will shall be sold on twelve months credit
 and to be equally divided amongst my beloved children. It is also
 my will that all the money that will be over paying all just
 demands should also be equally divided at my death. This also

my will that my beloved Daughter Elizabeth shall have full possession
of her house and land for her life time or as long as she may
continue a widow signed sealed published and delivered to be
my last will and testament this we covered by of before our
the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty
eight

I wish Thomas Nelson to have Fleming - I certify that
the above is the last nuncupative will of John Key Sr. that
was made called on by said Key especially to bear witness to the
same that said Key made the same three or four hours before
his death that he made the same during his last sickness in the
Bill Town & Hancock's being surprised on a visit from home to
Hinderton by sickness that we caused the said will to be put
in writing as nearly in the words of said Key as possible on
the 20th of January 1838 and that said Key died on the 10th of
January 1838
