Wrens Estee In the name of God Amme I stans Estee of the County of  
 Hie - Trauskin & State of Tennessee being of sound mind and memory  
 do make and ordain this my last Hie and Testiment  
 hereby revoking all other wills by me made. I thin my Hie  
 is that my Estate both real & personal after the paymunt  
 of all my just debts be equally divided among all my  
 Children David Rebecca & Ruth Elizabeth Jifford Estee  
 Elizabeth Jane Estee John Hells Estee Henry Ann Estee Isaac  
 Estee Catharine Estee James Bright Estee Sam Houston  
 Estee and my beloved wife Nancy Estee ishore & shone else  
 & shoule my wife Nancy desert from this provision of my  
 Hie then my Hie is that such part of my estate as  
 is by me entitled to by Law & by direction from my  
 Hie may obtain over & above all cheeds p<sup>t</sup> & thereof is to  
 be deducted from the share of my children of whoshe  
 is the mother & that my other children recive as though she  
 were to acquire into the provisons of my Hie. I thin  
 my Hie is that all my negroes except Peter and Lucy be  
 placed upon my Glade field tract of land to live & shole  
 occupy the same for twenty years under the direction  
 and control of my Executor & during a munity of the profits  
 of their labor to the use of my estate in chare of him as  
 my Executor may deem fittable & shall direct with  
 the advice and consent of my representatives hereafter to be  
 mentioned & at the end of the said Twenty years all of  
 isaid negroes & their children to be hereof to soon are to  
 be freed and are to have the said tract of land absolutely  
 as their property shold the Laws of the Country permit  
 this provision of my Hie to take effect or least shoud the  
 Laws not permit then to be free & remain in the Country  
 then my Hie is that my Executor continue to man age  
 and supply them as before provided that they are to have  
 the entire profits of their labor except so much as my  
 Executor may be entitld to as compensation for his trouble  
 & for the paymunt of their taxes & the taxes of the land which  
 amount is to be designated by my representative or a  
 majority of them & my slaves & my negro man Peter  
 he hould work to work by this trade job hould by a mounth of  
 my death the proceeds of his hire to go into my Estate but  
 at the end of said twenty years my Hie is he be subject  
 to all the benefits & to be compenred on my other negroes  
 also direct that come to task to hire Peter to hundre

masters and that he be dothed by my Executor in a style of  
 greater comfort and decency than bond negroes usually enjoy  
 Othen My will is that my wife Nancy be permitted to take my  
 negro woman Lucy & her increase at a reasonable price to her  
 paid by my Executor, with the above of my representations as  
 to a part of her share of my Estate if she may choose to do so but  
 if she should refuse it be done said negro woman & her increase  
 as above then my will is that said negro Lucy be set a cold  
 on the Glade fields to act with the other negroes & subject to  
 all the rules & stipulations herein specified as to them. Othen  
 my will is that should the Laws of the Commonwealth  
 allow my young negroes be instructed so as to be able to  
 read the Holy Scriptures by which alone men are instructed  
 how to live virtuously and happy in this life and to be prepared  
 for the life to come Obed to this end I desire that my Executor  
 shall calculate and enforce upon them any observance of the  
 Sabbath &c that on that day they be employed in no manner  
 to spend it in the publick worship of almighty God Othen  
 my Executor is hereby authorized to give a reasonable  
 compensation for instructing said negroes to read either  
 to such of my children as may be willing of Saturday's &  
 Sundays to teach them, or to such other person as he may  
 find fit convenient to employ Othen my will is that should  
 any of my negroes prove disorderly or refractory so that  
 they still not live at peace with the other negroes nor  
 readily submit to the control of my Executor they be sent  
 off from as may their misdeeds be to be tried and tryed  
 by my Executor from year to year as a punishment upon  
 them and as a means of their reformation as well as a  
 warning to the others &c that my Executor may cause  
 such refractory negroes to be placed upon said place whom  
 in his judgment that there shall be exact reformation  
 as well promote future good conduct. My wish is that  
 my Executor frequently as he knoweth to be done this  
 provision of my will. I then my will is that my Executor  
 give for the support of poor & widow ministers of the Gospel to  
 the amount of fifteen dollars per annum for the space of twenty  
 years my wish is that in bestowing this sum he doth  
 the name or seek to which any sum may belong but that  
 it be given in the name of his Beneficiaries and friends & his  
 deviation to his own & passing him & himself ~~and~~  
 joined almoner by my Executor of this my will  
 and I appoint my friends Nathan Green Benjamin Dugard  
 Peter & Richard David Dickins & Johnathan Dickins my  
 representatives to advise my Executor in all the matters here-  
 in before specified, to settle the amount of compensation  
 he shall receive for his trouble & to decide any difficulties  
 that may arise in relation to my Estate which division

shall be final in case of the death removal or refusal to act of  
my said Executor my wish is that the Gentleman who may at  
my death be judge of the Supreme Court of this State shall  
being made a just person to act in the execution of this my  
will which person so designated I appoint to carry its  
provisions into effect notwithstanding whereby I have caused to  
be sealed my name and affixed thereto at this 10<sup>th</sup> October  
A.D. 1837

Estell Jr. deceased was produced in open court

of a quick mind & disposing memory at the time of signing  
the same that he signed and affixed his seal

and in the presence of the testator ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> death further that after

writing. Thereupon it was ordered by the Court that said  
will be recorded as the last will & testament of Nathan Estell  
deceased Clerk of Franklin County at office Dec 4<sup>th</sup> 1847
