Whereas I William Dutton of County  
County & State of Tennessee being sick  
and in a weakly condition & coming  
to mind that it is now appointed for all  
men to die so make & ordain this my  
last will & Testament, & dispose of such  
worldly property as it hath pleased the  
Almighty to bless me with, in the following  
manner. And first,

I will, that after my decease, my body be  
interred in decent Christian burial, &  
that my funeral charges, & all my just  
debts be paid, out of my estate, by my  
Executors.

Item, I give & bequeath to my beloved  
wife Susanna Dutton, all my personal  
estate, for her support & maintenance,  
during her natural life and after her  
decease, that part of said estate that then  
remains to be disposed of as herein  
behold, that is to say:

I give and bequeath to my little granddaughter  
Susanna Dutton, who now lives with me  
one muley cow & calf, two sheep, with  
their respective accessories, one small  
Walnut Table, a small Walnut box,  
all the kitchen pot ware & all brass  
or copper dishes consisting of pewter,  
belf & Lyon articles, one feather bed & its  
furniture. I also give unto my  
said granddaughter the sum of twenty  
dollars in money, to be applied to the  
payment for her schooling, by my  
executors; & the other part of her  
legacy to be paid, or delivered to her,  
when she shall arrive at the age of  
Eighteen years or on her marriage,  
by my executors.

Item, I will, that after the decease of my  
beloved wife aforesaid, that what remains

of my estate, be sold, & that the monies arising therefrom, be equally divided amongst my children, that is to say, the children of those of my children that have deceased, to have a child's part divided amongst them by my executors, at their arrival at lawful age to receive it.


Item, I constitute & appoint Abraham Ballet, & Henry Earnest, the sole executors of this my last will & Testament.
