 bequests herein provided and that he pay to my said daughter  
 the said Selva Harrison, the said Two hundred dollars, when  
 she may call for the same, it being what I design for  
 her in room and stead of a portion of the land, and I  
 do hereby nominate and appoint my son Bureau Harrison  
 the Executor of this my last will and testament, in tes-  
 tifying whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal the  
 12<sup>th</sup> day of September 1855

The last will and testament of Mary Huntington dec'd. and proved 6<sup>th</sup> day of  
 April 1868, which is in the words and figures following to wit:

I Mary Huntington of said District disposing of my estate in good health  
 but considering the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death, I do hereby  
 publish the following to be my last will and testament, to be in full and effect  
 which I may have made.

I do give of force hereafter mentioned: that whereas under the last will of  
 my husband William Huntington, deceased & testator on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of February  
 1860, certain specific personal property was left to me, to wit my said husband's  
 parcel to wit: Two negro girls, (one a slave) (Selling this children) and all the  
 stock, hogs, sheep & other cattle, also the farming implements & the home  
 hold & kitchen furniture of every kind & species, and the said William  
 Huntington, mentioning the same of all my given and paid or to be paid,  
 to his children, Henry C. Huntington, Mary C. Power and other property principles  
 slaves and disposing of his lands in accordance with the said will  
 giving a part thereof to his son Alfred another part during my natural  
 life to me Mary Huntington then to William S. Huntington, expressing in  
 his said last will that it was his wish for William S. Huntington to his  
 with me to manage the farm, to wit: the above mentioned land bequeathed  
 to me first & afterwards to him the said W. S. Huntington, also to be  
 provided my house on the said tract of land. At the said time  
 I, Mary S. Huntington receiving in full, of all made claims after paying  
 necessary expenses, notice be liquidated & paid off the same of the said  
 said first hundred dollars, for & less on the said parcel of land going  
 to him at my death, to the Executors of the estate of said William  
 Huntington, my husband & the testator, in the above mentioned will the  
 same, by him made & signed, to wit: on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of February 1860, and  
 whereas great & marked changes have taken place since the publication  
 of said last will & testament, and since the death of said testator  
 William Huntington, Slave freed, great loss sustained in many other  
 kind of property, hogs, sheep, &c.

And knowing that nothing ever so poor & distressed for the family &  
 Sunday, incidental or necessary expenses was realized off the said tract  
 of parcel of land, given to me during my natural life, I have to  
 W. S. Huntington, during the late Civil War.

Therefore I Mary Huntington feel it my duty & have executed at my  
 personal & said last will of my husband Huntington to wit:  
 It is my will & desire that Henry C. Huntington have the sum of one  
 dollar, to be paid out of the office of my estate, but having already  
 having been amply provided for by his father as shown and he
