

A Copy of the last Will & Testament of Meloy Ball dec'd  
Filed and proved July 2nd 1863

I Meloy Ball do make this as my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all former wills, or other wills at any time made by me. First I direct that my funeral expenses and all my debts be paid as soon after my death as possible out of any money, that I may die possessed of, or may first come into the hands of my executors hereinafter to be appointed,

Secondly I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Jane Ball and good and lawful heirs the three shares belong to them & their heirs & assigns Cooking utensils and all other furniture of my house that would be wanted to necessary for house keeping, I give and bequeath that my friendly Gray, her my said wife and my said children no Cash, I give that my wife shall have her own Saddle and Bridle, her choice, and that she shall enjoy and keep possession of my house that I now live in, as her own during her life, or widowhood but at her death or marriage then and in that case the house is to belong to my son H. Ball, of whom I will hereafter speak, my wife and I direct is that my wife shall have one Choeer Cow, and if she chooseth she is to have 5 sheep 3 or 4 hogs I will and bequeath to my son John Ball all the land he lives on, it being the land I bought of John Ball Sr, on which he now lives, also all the place as the forks of the road called the old Watering grounds, when he John Ball now has a Store, and I approve of H. Ball's.

I will and bequeath unto my son Spencer H. Ball, all of my home place, extending to the top of the mountain east side and with the lower part upper end to have full possession of my home after the death or marriage of my wife, but to have full control of all the lands and out buildings, when this will takes effect

I will and bequeath unto my daughter N. Lucas formerly Nancy Ball, all of the place she lives on, and to the Mountain top each side as described in the piece I gave Spencer, my wife and I direct is that my daughter Polly Elizabeth who married Jacob Elizabeth, and her heirs in the State of Missouri shall pay to her, for the use of her, and her own children, by my Executors, to be appointed hereafter Six hundred dollars in Cash, I give and bequeath to my daughter Polly and her husband Jonathan Bennett all the land

of Polly that John Smith now lives on which land I bought of John Bennett and all the land joining the same on the side of Range Mountain to the top of the same, and in addition to this I give my daughter Polly Bennett to have paid to her by my Executors, 5 hundred dollars, which I think will make her equal with her sister Jane of Lucas, I give and I direct that my son John Ball living to his place in my Opinion being an Old Slave shall pay to me, or to my estate five hundred dollars, and that my son Spencer H. Ball shall with my Executor pay five hundred dollars, I further engage upon my two sons John Spencer Ball, to support my wife, with decent support during her life, or widowhood, the support to be born in equal proportions with both thus I do because their lands are valuable, and hence they should support my wife, and finally all other property personal and real debts, money, and every species shall be sold & collected by my executors and equally divided among my five children or their heirs, I do hereby nominate, and appoint my two sons John Ball and Spencer H. Ball my executors of this my last will and testament, in witness whereof I do to this my will set my hand and seal this 23<sup>rd</sup> day of April 1860.
