Copy to the Last Will & Testament of Joseph Andrew Rice from the 3rd day of June 1867.

I Joseph Andrew of the County of Hancock State of Tennessee being of sound mind and memory and considering the uncertainty of this frail and transitory life do therefore make and declare public and declare this to be my last will and Testament that is to say.

First— After all my lawful debts are paid and discharged the residue of my real and personal I give bequeath and dispose of as follows to wit:

2nd To my beloved wife Mary Sabitha the tract of land on which I now live containing seventy five acres more or less adjoining the lands of Christian Church & others between two maces and two acres and forty base of logs and six head of cattle and fifteen head of sheep and also the household and kitchen furniture and all my tools and furniture consisting of iron and mahogany. My wife is, and it is my will that my beloved wife Mary Sabitha have use and possession of the same during her life time and I may die single and unmarried, during her life time to dispose of it as she shall think best for her heirs and assigns.

3rd My wife is, at the death of my wife, Mary Sabitha that all of my estate real and personal or the proceeds thereof which may remain in her hands or otherwise disposed of, be equally divided between my sons Sabitha and my sister Mary Andrew. I have and I have appointed Thomas E. Brown Jr. to be my executor. I make constitute and appoint Thomas E. Brown Jr. to be my executor of this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name and affixed my seal, this twenty second day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty two.

Copy of James M. Burrell's will from the 3rd day of June 1867, from the estate of James M. Burrell, & P. L. Lunsdale, subscribers.

I James M. Burrell of the County of Hancock State of Tennessee being of sound mind and memory, do hereby make and publish this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all other wills by me made.

1st It is my request that my funeral expenses and all my just debts be paid by my executor as soon after my death as possible, then I give to be paid out of my personal estate.

2nd It is my desire that there be no public sale of my personal property but that my executor shall dispose of any of the same privately for the best price he can procure. And I do hereby bequeath and give unto my wife and widow Annabella Burrell our home and our mill, our place of store, and the other live stock I may die possessed of, also all the furniture and tools, and household articles I may have at the time of my death, also all my farming implements and stock of a wagon, plow, harness, and also all the stock in and all other articles of husbandry, I may have, also all the stock of Bacon, grain, and provisions for either man or beast in hand, also all the growing crops now standing or that may be growing on my lands at the time of my death, with any money or debts due me at my death to be paid absolutely, but out of this property to be bequeathed to my said wife and widow, must pay off such liabilities as I have before named, and also keep together my children that shall be under twenty one years of age, who I expect to see the

Third I will and bequeath to my son William H. leave my "Home Place" lying in Hawkins County Tennessee being that portion of the tract of land lying west of a line running from Carter Valley road at a point on said road about one half mile East of my present residence, to the back boundary line
