Copy of the Last Will & Testament of Margaret Barker
 The last will and testament of Margaret Barker
 I, Margaret Barker of the County of Nowhere
 and State of Indiana being in rational full health, of
 sound disposing mind and memory, do make and declare
 the following to be my last will and testament hereby
 giving and making void all wills made by me before
 this. My will is that I do direct that my executor hereafter
 named, out of the first moneys that may come into his
 hands, to pay unto the person or persons named and

my just debts.

Nextly, I give and bequeath to my son John H. Spangler the
 plantation on which he now lives and which was purchased
 from Geo. W. Painter and it is my will and desire that
 my said son John H. Spangler shall have all the farming
 lands, the two horse wagons, the Black South team, the
 harness, the two boxes of Cakes, the two best ponies,
 the fitting leaf table, the horse holder and kitchen furniture
 which I gave him heretofore and which he has had for
 session of. It also my will and desire that my said son
 John shall have my Clock, for and during his natural life
 and after his death, the said Clock shall belong to
 my Grand son W. H. Spangler, son of said John H. Spangler
 Polly his wife.

Lastly, I my will and desire and I do bequeath to my
 said Grand son John H. Spangler, my plantation known as
 the Peter Gamble farm, the same on which Thomas Stephens
 now lives, adjoining Samuel Webb's land, and also to him
 the right to be rented out and the proceeds thereof to be kept
 of as long after his death, until my said Grand son John H. Spangler
 shall have attained the age of twenty one years, and when
 he shall have attained the age of twenty one years, then
 the same, he shall have full possession of the same.

mind & memory and considering the uncertainty this
life and transitory life do therefore make certain pub-
