Orpha Elmore and Rutha Wolfe, share &c heirs.
above named, agree, may divide said property prop-
- erty without sale, otherwise set property shall be
divided between my said heirs above mentioned. Thus
the name of Elizabeth Graw was stricken out by my
Director Sterling Graw being indebted to me by note
to at least the worth of my real estate then in my
estate, which said note is for five hundred and
fifty dollars, due at one day after date 1st day
15th 1861, ended Aug 17th 1865 with \$120.⁰⁰ and
all interest up to the date.

Item 4th To Elizabeth Graw and her heirs, I give and
bequeath said note above described in lieu of all
their interest, as heirs in my estate, both present and
- nate.

Item 5th I hereby appoint my Trusty James Elbert

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Day & Nicholas Wolfe Executors of this my last will
and testament, signed herein and dated this 3rd day of May
in the Year of Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy
three.

Wells, the principal of said note to be safely
invested, and the interest, to be perpetually paid
as before directed to the Preacher of the Metho-

Hampshire.

I will all the remainder of my property to my

New Mills, during her life, and at her death I give from the proceeds of said property fifty dollars, to be paid to New Mills daughter of Ben Mills, and fifty dollars to Hannah Mills.

I hereby appoint Reuben Mills my Executor to see that this my last will is carried out as I have directed, dated this 11 day of October eighteen hundred and seventy three, Thomas Audenon, Nancy Mills, John M. Audenon, R. M. Jones.

I Thomas Audenon, being of sound mind and perfect memory, do make and publish this my last will and testament, in manner and form follow-

- First I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary Audenon, all my household and kitchen furniture to -
-gether with our domestic Mary during her natural life.
Secondly - I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy Williams, the house where I live including the lot of land as has already been divided to her.
Thirdly - I give and bequeath to my daughter-in-law Elizabeth Audenon and her heirs the house where she now lives and eight acres of land around said house.
Fourthly - I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Stone and her heirs the house where she now lives and eight acres of land around said house.
Fifthly - I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Payson and James M. Payson the place where they now live and eight acres of land around said house during their natural life. And the remainder of my lands to be equally divided between

Nancy Williams, Elizabeth Audenon, and her heirs Elizabeth Stone, and her heirs Mary Payson, and James M. Payson, and at the death of Mary Payson, and James M. Payson, their portion of the same to fall back to my lawful heirs.

Sixthly - I will and bequeath that all my money and property be equally divided between Nancy Williams, Elizabeth Audenon, and her heirs, Elizabeth Stone and her heirs, Mary Payson and James M. Payson.

I hereby nominate and appoint David R. Audenon my sole Executor of this my last will and testament. In witness of which I have hereunto set my hand and affix my seal this 2nd day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy two.

Copy of the last will and Testament of James S. Shipp, was from the 2nd day of May 1874.

I, James S. Shipp, of the County of Hawkins County, and State of Tennessee, being of sound mind; but growing feeble in thought; knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death, do make this my last will and Testament revoking and annulling all before.

Thus 1st In my son William S. Shipp, I bequeath or give a certain tract of land lying on the south side of Nolichucky river, in the upper end of Longs Bottom is being the same tract of land that was divided, by my father William Shipp beginning by a Sycamore on the river bank, near the upper end of the bottom, thence south 28 East 24 poles to where oak and pine grow as pointers on the top of the bluffing a sink of the same, thence south 71 East 63 poles to a hickory in the knee of a long hollow, thence south 36 East 104 poles to a poor oak on the ridge top of the mountain with post oak, dogwood and hickory as pointers, thence down the south side of the mountain, with a long hollow south 36 East 10 poles to a stake, and from there to the
