George Edgar: Will

In the name of God Amen I George Edgar of Jefferson County and State of Tennessee considering the uncertainty of this mortal life and being of sound mind and memory, blessed be God for the same. Do make and publish this my last will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say First I give unto my beloved wife Rebecca Edgar during her natural life this house in which I now dwell with the outhouses and plantation where I live now together with one hundred and fifty acres of land beginning at an ash tree near the South West Corner of the plantation near the creek thence East to the original line of the tract at a stake thence North along the original line to a white oak standing some twelve corners to the original survey thence a South westerly course that will strike the Creek ten poles above the spring well off water out of for the use of the family thence a South westerly course to a point that will strike the west line of the original tract so as to leave 50 acres of land lying in the original tract North & North West of the two last mentioned dividing lines & then from the said beginning ash tree a North westerly course to a stake on the original line of the said survey so as to leave one hundred & fifty acres including the house in which I now live and improvement adjoining which said last mentioned one hundred and fifty acres and house is for my dear wife during life (That no mistake may arise about the above Intestimento. I repeat

it, that fifty acres is to be in the piece above the spring and one hundred and fifty including the dwelling house, and one hundred acres adjoining the lands of Benjamin McFarland & Thomas Snodgrass, I also give my dear wife during life one several mares all the plantation tools, five head of Cattle, also all the sheep and all the house furniture, not otherwise disposed of, and ten head of hogs. Item. I give and bequeath to my son Alexander Edgar fifty acres of land lying the lot herein mentioned lying above the spring adjoining his land that has lain on for some years past my will also is that my son Alexander Edgar have the value of one hundred dollars in land to be laid off to him out of the tract I own lying on Boner Cuts path to be valued by two disinterested men which said land shall not include any of the improvement on spring.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Alexander Edgar the balance of my tract of land lying in this County and said Boner cuts path which said tract altogether contains at first four hundred acres. So that I may be fully understood my will is that my son Alexander Edgar do in one year after my decease pay unto my son Alexander Edgar one hundred dollars, and have the whole of the tract now belonging to me, but my said son Alexander shall not pay to my said son Alexander in the term of one year after one hundred dollars my said son Alexander is to have the worth of that sum in land as witness to said Alexander. And my son Alexander Edgar is to have the balance of that land for which I have neither sold my claim, nor given a conveyance to other persons, and if my said son Alexander

as in and year pay my son Edward and his wife
a dollar, then and in that case my son Andrew is not
to have any part of said land, and I allow my son
Andrew to have his choice whether he will pay said
sum or the money as aforesaid and keep the land, or
let Andrew have the land in the room of the land
I have a dollar of said property he make his
choice and pay the sum hundred dollars in one year
after my decease. I also give to my son Alexander
and his wife and his heirs to him and his heirs
forever. I give and bequeath to my daughter
