Viz. my will is that all my just debts be paid and funeral expenses out of my estate by my Executors hereafter named.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Rhoda Lea during her Widowhood the tract of Land I now live on containing two hundred and fifty acres, together with the buildings and improvements on the same as also all my Household furniture.

negro Slaves that I now possess, with their issue, as also stock of all kind and farming tools of every description for her support and for the purpose of raising and schooling my children, the degrees of learning and schooling my children to be judged and regulated.

as the Executors of this my last Will may think proper. So as to leave a balance sufficient to support my Family and in case my Widow should marry, it is my Will that my whole estate be sold and an equal division made thereof between my present wife and surviving children, and I do hereby nominate and appoint my Friends Charles B. Jarnagin and Samuel Carson Executors of this my last Will and testament in Witness whereof I do hereunto set my hand and seal this 18th of July 1816.

In the name of God Amen. I Richard Burtch of the County of Jefferson and State of Tennessee: Being feeble and weak as to bodily strength but of sound mind and memory blessed be God; Do this Twentieth day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and twenty two. (Make and publish this my Last Will and Testament in manner following (that is to say) I premies I give and bequeath to my loving wife Anna Burtch all that plantation that I bought from William Hanes Whence Joshua dells formerly lived being One hundred and nine Acres for which I have William Hanes Bond to make me a Right to be hers during her natural Life. if she should outlive me and no longer: And if my dear Wife should outlive me. It is my desire and will at her decease. that the same one hundred and nine acres of Land above described be divided Equally between my three sons Elizab Burtch Richard Burtch & William Burtch; And that the same be to them and their heirs forever; and it is further my will and desire that my Loving Wife Anna Burtch should have all the house hold furniture and farming Utentials for her own use and to dispose of them as she shall think proper; And likewise one Sord (Mare) that I desire to be for her use and that she may dispose of the same as she thinks best: Item I Give to my son Richard Burtch one Black Horse to him and his heirs forever;

Item I Give and bequeath to my son William Burtch one Rifle gun and all the Smith tools which I have. to him and his heirs forever. And it is further my will and desire that my three daughters Polly Burtch, Isabella Burtch, and Anna Burtch, Each of them if they should marry, at the time of their marriage should have one Cow Each to them and their heirs forever: And my further will is that my four children George Burtch Jane Shipley John Burtch and Resanna Shipley keep all the property which I have Delivered to them heretofore to them and their heirs forever. And it is further my will and desire that my Executrix herein after to be named shall pay all my Just debts and expences. And I do appoint my Beloved wife Anna Burtch Executrix of this my last Will and testament and it is my will that she may act without giving security. In Witness Whereof I the said Richard Burtch have hereunto set my hand and seal this Twentieth day of January Eighteen hundred and twenty two. I Joseph McCullah of the State of Tennessee and County of Jefferson, Being in perfect health of body and of perfect mind and memory. Thanks be to God for his Mercies, calling to mind the mortality of my body and that it is appointed for all men ~~once~~ to die do make and ordain this my

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last Will and testament. And principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hand of Almighty God who gave it. Nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty power of God. And my Body I recommend to the earth to be Buried in decent Christian Burial at the discretion of my Executors. And as for such worldly goods wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with in this world. I give, dispose and dispose of the same in the following manner and form, and first it is my will that all my just debts should be paid out of my Estate.
