Copy The last will and Testament of Samuel Carrick deceased as produced to Court for probate & admission, John McCallum Robert Houston and Francis B. Ramey being duly sworn say that they are well acquainted with the hand writing and signature of Samuel Carrick deceased, and that they believe the same subscriber to the instrument of writing purporting to be the last will and Testament of the said Samuel is in his own hand writing, which will is as a directed to Beers and is in the following words to wit:

In the name of God I meet, on the twenty second day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and five I Samuel Carrick of & married in the County of Prince and State of Tennessee being in the full exercise of my powers both of body and mind, but knowing the uncertainty of human life and that all men must die do make and ordain this my last will and Testament, for the disposal of my worldly estate in the following manner:

In the first place it is my will that all my estate both real and personal except such articles as are herein specially bequeathed shall be paid at cash once by three respectable freeholders on oath or any two of them approved by the County Court of Prince for that purpose, and that the said estate both land and movable shall remain in the possession of my wife for the support of the family, except so much and at such times as may be necessary for the payment of the following legacies viz:

First and bequeath to my beloved wife Annis one hundred and twenty five parts of the value of all my movable to be at her own disposal, and also one third part of the value of my land during the term of her natural life. Again it is my will that one hundred dollars shall be paid out of my estate within one year after my decease to my son Samuel B. Carrick as a compensation for the mudanes instruments and books which I received from him, and that such French books of his as are in my possession and his legal executors with pecuniary shall be returned to him, Again I give and bequeath to my daughter Polly White, my pocket Bible, which was the property of her dear mother and also my two & three volumes of Moses Universal Geography.

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Again it is my will that one hundred dollars shall be paid out of my estate to my son Addison Carrick against the twentieth day of July eighteen hundred and nine, as a compensation for his term which he allowed me to sell for fifty seven dollars.

Again it is my will that one ninth part of my estate shall be paid out of it to my son John Lewis Carrick against the twentieth day of November 1815.

Again it is my will that one ninth part of my estate shall be paid out of it to my daughter Polly White Carrick against the third day of May eighteen hundred and nineteen or at the time of her marriage if that should be sooner.

Again it is my will that one ninth part of the value of my estate shall be paid out of it to my son Wm. McCallum Carrick against the twenty ninth day of November eighteen hundred and twenty two.

And lastly It is my will that all the remainder of my estate be equally divided amongst my six children; and do hereby appoint my wife Annis together with my son Samuel Carrick and my brother in law Wm. McCallum to be executors of this my last will and Testament, In witness whereof I have set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

Whereas I have reason to believe that my father who is yet living in the State of Pennsylvania has made a disposition or bequeathed something considerable to me in his will. I do give & bequeath my right to the said legacy to my son in law Hugh Garrison White, recommending to his discretion I noted my son Samuel & Addison, if the said legacy should be worth a dollar.
