William Roan

The last Will and testament of William Roan deceased was produced to Court for probate, Whereupon John Martin & Aaron Gamble, two of the subscribing Witnesses thereto made Oath, that they saw the said William Roan sign seal, and heard him publish pronounce & declare the same to be his last Will & Testament & that he was at the time of publishing the same of sound and perfect mind & memory, to the best of their knowledge & belief; And that they saw Abathie Walker sign his name as a concurring evidence thereto, which Will is ordered to be recorded & is in these words, to wit,

In the name of God Amen, I William Roan of Knox County, being sick and weak in body, but by the blessing of God, of sound mind & memory, calling to mind, that it is appointed to all once to die, do commit my soul to the hand of God who gave it, and my body to the dust to be buried in a decent & Christian like manner, in confidence that my soul and body will be united again at the resurrection of the just, And as to that portion of worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life, I do give devise and bequeath the same in the following manner and form. *Wm*

In the first place it is my will and desire that all my just debts shall be punctually paid & discharged, and my lawful contracts fulfilled and necessary expences paid. In the next place I do give bequeath and devise to my dearly beloved wife Elizabeth, all my lands & Tenements to hold the same with all the rents profits and advantages arising therefrom for & during the term of her natural life, with this exception only, that if John Campbell should at any time be desirous of selling that small tract of land, which he holds in common with me, by purchase from John Johnston, if the title can in an amicable manner be secured from embroilment and a contest

price be had for it, I desire my executors herein after named to join him in the sale and conveyance of that tract. And after deducting what may be necessary for securing the title to place at Interest the remainder of the price that may be obtained for my half of the tract, which Interest shall be for the sole use of my wife during her life. I also give and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife for her sole use and disposal, all my farming tools & implements of Husbandry all my household & Kitchen-furniture my books and clothing and grain of every kind, which may be on hand at the time of my decease, also all my stock of sheep and hogs, and two horses and three cows and calves, such as she may choose, also I allow her to keep Meredith Howard, an apprentice boy bound to me by the court of Knox county, and have the benefit of his service during the time for which he was bound, and I further bequeath to her the sum of two hundred Dollars of the money due on account of the sale of my land in Pennsylvania to be paid out of the first money that shall be collected after the payment of my just debts. I also give and bequeath and devise to my Nephew William Roane after the death of my wife, One hundred and eighty acres of Land, being part of the tract I now live on to be taken off the lower end by a line running parallel with the lower line of said tract to hold to him and his heirs forever, I also bequeath to him my cut saw. — All the residue of my real estate after the death of my wife, I give and devise to my four Nephews William Burr son of my sister Margaret Thomas Tootle son of my sister Jennet, William McBliester son of my sister Sarah, and the youngest son of my brother Hugh, that may be alive at the time of my decease, to hold to them & their heirs, as Tenants in common. But if it should so happen that the tract of land which

I hold in common with John Campbell should be sold during the life of my wife, in that case the principal sum which may be obtained for it after deducting what may have been advanced for securing the title and other necessary expences, shall be equally divided after her decease, among my four Nephews last mentioned. — It is my will and desire that my executors should sell and dispose of all the remainder of stock my horses and Cattle and all my other personal property not herein bequeathed, which I may have at the time of my decease, or which may afterwards be paid to them in discharge of any contract, and out of the money arising from such sales to purchase a saddle for my niece Isabella Campbell, as good as the saddle heretofore purchased for my sister Martha, and I do also bequeath to each of my Nieces Martha & Isabella Campbell, a good servicable riding horse that is to be purchased out of the money arising from such sales and delivered, to each of them as soon as may be after their marriage. — And I further direct that forty Dollars be paid to said Isabella, out of the last payment which may be received on account of the sale of my land in Pennsylvania. — After providing for the payment of the before mentioned bequests, if the situation and circumstances of my estate will admit, it is my Will & desire that my executors purchase & give a habit pattern to each of my Nieces, Mary To Roane, Anne C. Roane and Margaret C. Roane, — The residue of my personal estate if any, I give and bequeath to my five Nephews before mentioned, William Roane William Burr Thomas Tootle William McBliester, and the youngest son of my brother Hugh Roane. Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth my executrix, and my Brother Archibald Roane, and John A. Gamble of Knoxville Executors of this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking and disannulling all former

former Wills by me at any time heretofore made -

826 The last Will and Testament of David Campbell deceased was produced to Court for probate, whereupon John Smith and James Campbell made oath that they saw David Campbell sign seal and publish the same as his last Will and Testament and that he was at the time of publishing same of sound mind and perfect memory to the best of their knowledge and belief that they saw Robert Campbell sign his name as a concurring witness thereto, which Will, is ordered to be recorded and is in these words, to wit,

I David Campbell of the County of Knox and State of Tennessee, being weak and feeble in body but by the blessing of God, of sound mind and memory, bearing in mind that it is appointed to all men once to die, Do make this my last Will and Testament, and commit my soul to the hand of God who gave it, and my body to the earth, to be buried in a decent and Christian like manner. And as to that portion of my worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life, I do give and bequeath of it in the following manner that is to say—

In the first place, my just debts are to be paid; To my beloved Wife Jean, I bequeath two feather Beds and furniture— I also bequeath to her during her life, all my other household furniture and my negro Woman (Charlot and her daughter Lettie, also she is to have during life support and maintenance, from the profits of the home plantation— I give and devise to my sons William and David, and to their heirs forever, all that tract of land which I purchased from Thomas C. Clark, to be equally divided them according to quantity and quality— My son Alexander has heretofore received from me what I consider as his full share of my real and personal estate, and William his full share of my personal estate— It is my desire that each of my two Daughters Mary and Margaret keep her Bed and furniture, and that my other Daughters have an Opportunity of making beds of equal value for themselves— To my daughter Mary I give a Negro Girl named Aggy To my Daughter Margaret, a Negro Girl named Lucy and

And after the death my Wife, I give to my sons and John, the negroes Charlot and Letha; but during the life of my Wife, there should be any increase of the Negroes, such increase is not to be considered as the property of those to whom they are herein before given, but my other daughters (Mary and Betsy) shall each have one negro child if there shall be so many, and if there shall be more than two of increase, then my son David shall be entitled to one — If it should ever happen that there shall be greater increase, then such equitable distribution to be made of the residue that the share of each may be of equal value as nearly as can be done —

As it is my desire that my Wife and Children unmarried should continue to live together as a family, all my stock of every description, my farming tools and implements of husbandry and personal estate, not before specially bequeathed are to be kept on the home plantation during the life of my Wife, and the profits arising from the farm stock, &c. to be for the general use of the family; Or if William and David settle on, and cultivate the tract of land here before devised to them, they shall be entitled to the use of the Wagon, equally with the other part of the family, — and on the marriage of any of my children (except those already provided for as to personal estate) it is my desire that my executor should allot to such child, such part of my personal estate as will be equal in value to that which I have given to my son Alexander and after the death of my Wife, such distribution

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of the residue to be made, as will make them all equal as nearly as may be —

If at any time any of the stock should increase so as to be more than will be needful, to keep on the farm, my executor shall have power to sell either at publick or private sale, as many as they may deem necessary, and apply the proceeds of such sales, to the use and benefit of the family —

After the death of my Wife, I give and devise my home plantation and tract of land to my two sons James and John, and to their heirs forever, but with this express condition, that it is still to remain and be considered a home, for all or any of my Daughters while they continue unmarried —

If any difficulties, or disputes should unfortunately arise, concerning the execution of this my last Will or any valuation of property that may become necessary, it is my Will and desire that all such disputes be referred to some discreet and judicious men to determine the same —

Lastly, I do hereby constitute and appoint my Brother James Campbell, and his son William Campbell and my son William L. Campbell Executors of this my last Will and Testament, revoking and disannulling all former Wills, by me at any time made —
