The Last will and Testament of Francis A. Ramsey was produced to Court for probate And it appearing that there was no subscribing witness thereto - Whereupon Charles McClinton having relinquished his right to execute said Will being therein appointed an Executor - and the said Charles John Callaway and Pysor Lea having examined the said Will with the Codicil thereto annexed make oath that they are well acquainted with the hand write of the said Francis A. Ramsey that they have seen him write frequently - and that they believe said Will & Codicil or memorandum annexed thereto to be all his own proper hand write, and the same is admitted to record and is in the words and figures following to wit -

In the name of God Amen, I Francis A. For which purpose I allow my Executors herein of their names, to sell and make deeds for my Land in Williamson County

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on Rutland's Creek, also 1500 Acres in White County - which Lands may be sold for such sums, as can be had for them, and if the sale of the said Lands together with money now due and in Bonds and Notes now in my possession, together with the money now due to me by James Rogers for the Land on which he now lives and by Mrs. Davis for 1500 Acres when she now lives will be found insufficient to pay my Debts - I allow my Executors to sell the Lot I own in Knoxville in order to pay all debts due by me, and the remainder of my Estate I allow to be equally divided amongst my Wife and Children, only allowing my two oldest sons, and my daughter eight hundred dollars each, over and above what I allow my wife and my son John McClinton Alexander, which sum of eight hundred dollars each was given to me in trust, for my said three Children by their Honoured Grand Father John McClinton Alexander Esqr. by an assign ment to me of various Bonds Notes and different persons, which Notes and Bonds in the hands of my Brother William B. Alexander of Mecklenburg County North Carolina for collection, and if any of said Notes fail to be collected, there is to be that much of a deduction from the said sums and to be equally sustained by my said three Children - My Will is that the aforesaid equal sharing the time of her natural life, or at her death to be equally divided amongst my four Children -

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And hereby nominate and appoint my long known and approved friends Charles McElroy and Archibald Brown Esqs and my brother the Reverend Samuel G Ramsey the Executors of this my last Will and Testament also Guardian to my young son John McNitt Alexander Ramsey - Certifying that they nor neither of them shall be required by the Court to give bond for their faithful execution of this my last Will - hereby I revoke all former Wills by me made, made clear this to now be my last and Testament, and as this can easily be established to be my hand writing, and my usual signature - I have hereunto set my hand and seal the 31st day of May 1816 being the day of the year on which I was born and no writing present
