I give and bequeath to my wife Agatha during her life of widowhood my negro woman Study and my boy Isaac, also my sorrel mare and family Bible, saddle & bridle. To my daughter my negro girl Lucy, Emily, also my sorrel, scott with a blaze face, saddle and bridle. The balance of my property consisting of two negroes, three head of horses, three hogs, sheep, crop of corn, cotton farming tools, household and kitchen furniture to be sold for discharge of my just debts and if there is any thing more than enough, the remainder to be equally divided among all my children and in case of my wife death or marriage the property will be to her to be equally divided among my children. I have hereunto set my hand and seal, I appoint my son Greenberry Garrett and my wife Agatha Garrett Executor and executrix to this my last will and Testament, Given under my hand and seal this 2nd of December 1823.
