ing lawfull heirs of their body, that the
Estate given to them by this will shall go to
the survivor or the one that out lives the
other all the rest of my children Sarah
Hilton, Betsy Huff, Betsy Buchanan,
John Waddy, & Nancy Huntington, I have gave
them their parts of my Estate some time ago
as much as I intend to give them, & do
here by appoint my wife Jane Waddy, Executor
& my son John Waddy, & son in law James
Buchanan, Executors to this my last will
& testament given under my hand & seal
this sixth the day of July Eighteen hundred
& fourty

and all my working tools and at the death or
marriage of my wife this thirty acre tract of land
that I now live on to be left to my beloved
grandson Andrew Buam Spaulley and thirty acres
of land joining the above named named tract to
be the property of my grand daughter Polly
Winborn also ~~and~~ and furniture at the death
of my wife I acknowledge this to be my last
will and Testament renouncing all other wills
deeds & legacies by me made at any time in
writing where of I have unto set my hand
and seal this day and date first alone written
