was also appointed executor by said will
being a minor under the age of seventeen
years was not admitted by the Court to
qualify as an executor on account of his
minority

for one hundred & twenty seven & one half dollars
to Charles Poole
4th) also all my Farming tools to Charles Poole
5th) also a Negro man willed by my Father to me
to Charles Poole. In witness whereof James
Cummins of the County of Lincoln & State
Tennessee have here unto set my hand &
seal this 15th day of Sept 1814
