Whereupon Ezekiel Clay the executor therein named resumed his executorship in writing and on motion of Alexander Snow he is appointed by the Court administrator of the said John Beard deceased with the will annexed who took the oath of an administrator & gave bond and security as such Administrator was moved by the Court that his Certificate be accordingly & in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand & affixed the Seal of

Isaac Hays's Will

In the name of God amen Isaac Hays of the County of Lincoln and State of Tennessee being sick of body but of sound mind and disposing memory (praise be to God) and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life, and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly substance, as it hath pleased God to bless me with, I give and bequeath the same in manner following, that is to say - I give and bequeath to my wife Isabella, her clothes and furniture two horses and all my household and kitchen furniture and Plantation tools during her lifetime - and after her death the aforesaid property to be divided equally between my two sons Thomas and Henry. And I further will and bequeath that the sum of two hundred and twenty three Dollars that is now in the hands of my sons Thomas and Henry and due to me that is to say three hundred and eighty Dollars in the hands of Thomas and two hundred and forty three Dollars in the hands of Henry, be and remain in their hands until the death of myself and the death of my wife Isabella, and then for them to pay unto the heirs of my daughter Lucretia Killingsworth and being Thomas

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the sum of ~~one~~ hundred Dollars that is three hundred Dollars to the heirs of Lucretia and the same sum to the heirs of Betsey out of the aforesaid sum of ~~one~~ hundred and twenty three dollars, and which sum of three hundred Dollars to the heirs of the said Lucretia & Betsey. The said Thomas, Henry and William H. Hays are bound to pay them by virtue of a deed of gift by me heretofore given. Item I give and bequeath to my son Jesse Hays fifty cents, and to my Daughters Lucretia, William worth Betsey Thompson, Mary Moore, Rebecca Haysway and Sarah Blakes the sum of fifty each four, and lastly, I do hereby constitute and appoint my sons sons Thomas Hays and Henry Hays Executors of this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all other former wills or Testaments by me heretofore made — in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the twenty eighth day of January eighteen hundred and twenty two.
