Isaac Hays's Will

In the name of God amen Isaac Hays of the County of Lincoln and State of Tennessee being sick of body but of sound mind and disposing memory (praised be God) and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life, and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly substance, as it hath pleased God to bless me with, I give and bequeath the same in manner following, that is to say - I give and bequeath to my wife Isabella, her clothes and furniture two horses and all my household and kitchen furniture and Plantation tools during her lifetime - and after her death the aforesaid property to be divided equally between my two sons Thomas and Henry. And I further will and bequeath that the sum of two hundred and twenty three Dollars that is now in the hands of my sons Thomas and Henry and due to me that is to say three hundred and eighty Dollars in the hands of Thomas and two hundred and forty three Dollars in the hands of Henry, be and remain in their hands until the death of myself and the death of my wife Isabella, and then for them to pay unto the heirs of my daughter Lucretia Killingsworth and being Thomas
