Now all men by these presents that I Thomas Wilson of the County & State aforesaid being at present in a true state of health and under apprehensions of approaching dissolution and being also in full possession and exercise of reason, I do therefore, make and constitute the following as my last will & testament. And first I do will the payment of all my just debts. 2nd. I do will & bequeath to my wife Elizabeth Wilson one third of the produce of the land on which I now live during her life, if so much by her shall be demanded. And also I bequeath to her the said Elizabeth Wilson my gray mare and one pink cow to be taken from my stock at her own choosing, and also two hundred & fifty dollars in cash & I do bequeath my wife, the said Elizabeth Wilson, half the cup board furniture and all the household furniture and one bed and furniture, all to be disposed of at her pleasure.

3rd. I do will and bequeath to my two sons James Wilson and Thomas Wilson the whole of the tract of land on which I now live, containing two hundred and forty acres to be equally divided between them in such manner as wisdom and justice may direct.

4th. I do by these presents will and bequeath to the aforesaid Thomas Wilson my wagon and furniture to her belonging, together with all the tools to her belonging at present appertaining to my farm & also I bequeath to my son the said Thomas Wilson my bay horse called Rally and a bay filly which has been considered his property heretofore. And I do farther bequeath to my son ^{as above mentioned} James Wilson one sorrel horse with a bald face which also has been named his for some time by gone.

5th. I do by these presents bequeath to my son Matthew Wilson one sorrel horse which he formerly used as a saddle horse or a black filly which he claimed heretofore at his own choice.

6th. I do farther by these presents will & bequeath to my son Washington Wilson one young horse, the same which he has heretofore claimed as his & fifty dollars in cash to be paid to him by my two sons James & Thomas Wilson at once mentioned which sum he is to receive soon as he is of age in law.

7th. I do by these presents will & bequeath to my daughter Betty Wilson one bay mare & also a red & white cow & some

quantity which is to be found to her by two sons James ^{and} Thomas above named. And I also bequeath to the said Betty Wilson one cow and calf and one horse & furniture to her belonging at present & also one half of the cupboard furniture and also her bed and furniture and also fifty dollars in cash to be paid to the said Betty Wilson soon as she is of age in law by my two sons James and Thomas Wilson above mentioned. And I do farther, notwithstanding any bequest herein before made to the contrary will and bequeath to my said daughter Betty Wilson a comfortable sustentation for support so long as she remain unmarried on the aforesaid premises as ready bequeathed to my two sons James and Thomas Wilson &c. I do by these presents will & bequeath to my two sons Robert William & John Wilson, to each of them one dollar & fifty cents, I do farther bequeath to my two sons James & Thomas Wilson above mentioned the two remaining horses of my stock of which James Wilson is to have choice.

8th. I do farther by these presents will and bequeath to my little grandson now known by the name of Benjamin a sufficient sum to purchase his instructions in English learning so as to qualify him for common business and I do farther bequeath that said sum be taken the two parts out of the division already willed to my two sons last names and the balance out of the division above willed to my wife Elizabeth Wilson. 9th. I do by these presents appoint and constitute my brother Robert Wilson and my friend Samuel ^{Scott} my sole executors of this my last will and commit the care of my family to them, and I do by these presents ratify the above my last will and testament to the disavowing of all others by me at any time made.  make this my last will and Testament
 I give to my Daughter Nancy one Negro
 Girl Kitty and horse bridle & saddle, a bed
 and furniture & one cow, I do give to my
 Daughter Martha one Negro girl Dolly
 one horse bridle & saddle, one bed & furniture
 and one cow, I do give to my Daughter
 Spalding one Negro girl Mary horse bridle
 and saddle, one bed & furniture & one cow
 I give to my Daughter Sus an one Negro
 Girl Easter one horse saddle and bridle, one
 bed and furniture, and one cow, I give to
 my Daughter Mary one Negro girl, I lay
 one horse bridle and saddle, one bed & furniture
 and one cow, I give to my Son Charles
 Morgan one Negro boy Frank, one horse
 bridle and saddle, one bed & furniture, and
 I give to my Son Hiram Morgan one
 Negro boy Bill, one horse bridle and saddle
 and bed and furniture, I give to my Son
 John Morgan one Negro boy Matt, one
 horse bridle & saddle, bed and furniture,
 I do leave the whole of Land, to be
 Equally divided between my three Sons
 above mentioned, except a tract of land
 on boiling fork of Elk river in Franklin
 County which is to be sold, I do give
 to my Wife Mary Morgan the use of
 my plantation and all Negroes that
 is not above mentioned & farming
 tools & stock with the house hold furni-
 - ture that is ^{not} mentioned for the use of
 Raising and Schooling of my children
 and then at her death or discretion
