William Woody of the County of Lincoln State
of Illinois, being weak in body but of a perfect sound
mind & memory thanks be to God for the same, do
make & declare this my last will & Testament
in the manner & form as followeth. First I give
my soul to God who gave it to me, & my body
to the earth to be decently buried by my exe-
cutors here after named, I give devise & bequeath
unto my beloved Wife Jane Woody the whole
of the ~~land~~ ^{house} and what on I now live, house
household furniture & appertinances, thereunto
belonging during her widowhood, I like wife
give & bequeath unto my wife all my stock of
horses, cattle, sheep, & shop during her widow-
hood, My will & desire is in case my wife Mary
again. I give devise & bequeath the said tract of
land that is given to her during her widowhood
to my son William Bank Woody, his heirs & assigns
for ever, I give devise & bequeath unto my wife
in case she marry again, the third part of
all my stocks of horses, cattle, sheep & shop
that may be left at the time of such
marriage, to her, her heirs & assigns forever,
the balance of the said household furniture
I give devise & bequeath unto my Daughter,
Jane Woody excepting one bed & furniture &
give & bequeath unto my son William Bank Woody
his heirs & assigns for ever the balance of the
said stocks of horses, cattle, sheep, & all other
personal estate I give devise & bequeath unto
my son William B. Woody & to my Daughter Jane

Waddy to be equally divided between them at
the time of the marriage of my wife, if such an
event should happen in case my wife should
not marry, all the Land that is willed to her
during her absence, at her death, I give &
bequeath the said land to my son
William Banks Waddy his heirs & assigns forever
also all the personal estate of every kind
that may be left at the death of my wife
I give devise & bequeath unto my son William
Banks Waddy & to my daughter Jane Waddy
to be divided between them in the same man-
ner as directed in this will in case my wife
marry again. My desire is in case either
my son William B Waddy or my daughter
Jane Waddy, departs this life with out leav-
ing lawfull heirs of their body, that the
Estate given to them by this will shall go to
the survivor or the one that out lives the
other all the rest of my children Sarah
Hilton, Betsy Huff, Betsy Buchanan,
John Waddy, & Nancy Huntington, I have gave
them their parts of my Estate some time ago
as much as I intend to give them, & do
here by appoint my wife Jane Waddy, Executor
& my son John Waddy, & son in law James
Buchanan, Executors to this my last will
& testament given under my hand & seal
this sixth the day of July Eighteen hundred
& fourty
