Except my negro slave he shall be at liberty to choose his master amongst the heirs and I do hereby appoint my three sons William, John and Nathan Brown my executors to this my last will and testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this the 24<sup>th</sup> day of September 1841.

### I Nancy Cunningham's Will

In the name of God Amen I Nancy Cunningham of the State of Tennessee and County of Lincoln being weak of body but of sound mind and disposing memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament revoking all others by me hitherto made. And as touching what estate it has pleased God to bless me with I leave, give and bequeath in the following manner (to wit)

1<sup>st</sup> My will and desire is and I give and bequeath unto Rebecca Allen a young woman I have principally raised one feather bed, one boulder, one pillow, one under sheet, one blanket and a checked counterpane and two bed quilts, eight dollars in money.

2<sup>d</sup> I give unto my son-in-law John Cunningham nine dollars which he has already received and I give unto my daughter Sally Cunningham a part of my wearing apparel clothes

3<sup>rd</sup> I give unto Nancy Cunningham my daughter part of my wearing clothes and part of bed clothes and five dollars in money and my saddle

4<sup>th</sup> I give unto Cincinnati Grace my daughter-in-law part of my wearing clothes I give unto John Grace my son thirty three dollars and some cents being the amount of a note I have on him.

5<sup>th</sup> I give unto Elizabeth Morel my daughter a part of my

wearing clothes and part of my bed clothes

6<sup>th</sup> I give unto my grand daughter Nancy Morel daughter of James Morel my Cupboard and that in it,

7<sup>th</sup> My will and desire is that my beds and bed clothes that are not otherwise disposed of be divided as herefore mentioned equally between John Grace, Elizabeth Morel and Rebecca Ashby without a sale

8<sup>th</sup> My will and desire is that all the balance of my property be sold on credit of twelve months and the money then arising together with the money owing me, after paying my just debts and expenses be equally divided between my son John Grace, Rebecca Ashby and Elizabeth Morel my daughters

9<sup>th</sup> My will and desire is that my son-in-law Harris Ashby and my son John Grace by my request to this my last will and Testament believing they will see it properly executed, December the 12<sup>th</sup> 1841.

### I Aaron Wells of the County of Lincoln and State of Tennessee do make and publish this my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all former wills by me at any time heretofore made

First I direct that my body be decently interred in a manner suitable to my former course of life. As to such worldly estate and chattels I have pleased God to entrust me with I dispose of the same as follows

Secondly I direct that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid so soon after my death as possible out of any money that I may die possessed of or which may first come into the hands of my executors from any portion of Estate real or personal

Thirdly I give and bequeath to my dear beloved wife Mary

Wells her execable possession of my dwelling house and a comfortable  
and sufficient support of my home plantation with the house hold and kitchen  
furniture and my negro man and woman Joshua and Venus  
during her natural life or widowhood. But should my wife at any  
time intermarry with any other man. My wish is that she have one half  
of my household and Kitchen furniture with my first choice of  
horses and first choice of Cows and Calves and a like portion of  
my sheep and hogs.

Thirdly I gave and bequeath to my grand son Alexander St.  
Dobbin my plantation wherein I now live including a small  
part of the tract of land that I purchased of William B.  
Wright lying on the fork of the main Swan Creek and the  
west fork of Swan Creek bounded with said creeks to a cut  
off and the main Swan Creek to line of my home plantation  
and then give it Dobbin to keep his grand mother Mary Wells  
in execable possession of the portion allotted her.

Fourthly I gave and bequeath to my grand daughter Narcissa  
McKinney and to heirs of her body the tract or piece of land of  
lying in the Fayetteville road below the ford on Swan Creek  
being the tract of land purchased of James Bright agent for John  
Bright.

Fifthly I gave and bequeath to my grand daughter Josephine Wood  
and to the heirs of her body the plantation that I purchased of  
William B. Wright Excluding the part take from said tract  
and attached to the home plantation. My tract of ridge land  
lying on the channel ridge North of Eliza Sackett to be equally divided  
between A. D. St. Dobbin and Josephine Wood and the heirs of her body.  
My wish and desire is that the before allotted tracts of land shall  
be valued by W. B. Wright, Jacob Bright, Boone Wilson and Davis  
Amidst the said tracts of land to be made equal by the claimants  
paying to each other the difference in valuation.

Sixthly As I have heretofore given to Narcissa McKinney a negro  
girl I do now allot to the balance of my grand children negro  
girl as follow to Alex. Ben St. Dobbin Vesta and child and to  
Josephine Wood and to the heirs of her body either to Adeline Dobbin  
and to heirs of her body Alice and to Caldonia Dobbin and to the  
heirs of her body Rachael.

Seventhly I gave and bequeath to Adeline Dobbin and Caldonia  
Dobbin and to the heirs of their body an equal portion of my Negroes  
to make their parts equal in value to the parts given in land to  
Narcissa McKinney, Alex. A. D. St. Dobbin and Josephine Wood.

Eighthly I gave and bequeath to my daughter Sally Dobbin  
my negro girl Ann during her natural life or widowhood.

Ninthly The remaining portion of my negroes if any after the  
portions already given, to be equally divided between Alexander Ben  
St. Dobbin, Narcissa McKinney, Josephine Wood, Adeline Dobbin  
and Caldonia Dobbin and to their heirs and the heirs of their body.

Tenthly As I wish no portion of my perishable to be sold no  
further than is actually necessary upon the account of the heirs not  
of age I give and bequeath the whole of my stock including  
Horses, Cows, Hogs and Sheep to be equally divided between Alex-  
ander St. Dobbin, Narcissa McKinney, Josephine Wood, Adeline and  
Caldonia Dobbin and to their heirs and the heirs of their body.

Eleventhly I do give and bequeath in addition to what I  
have given to Alexander A. D. St. Dobbin the whole of my Farming tools

including my wagon also all my mill tools.

And as Isaac Pearson has now set in to oversee for me the  
present year I wish him to be continued agreeable to our custom.

Sixthly I do hereby make and appoint my grandson Alexander  
A. D. St. Dobbin and my two grand sons in law Fra McKinney and  
John Wood my executors to this my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I Aaron Wells the said Testator have to  
this my will written me on sheet of paper set my hand  
and affixed my seal this the 25th day of January one thousand eight  
hundred and forty two.
