But if I should, owe debts, which then paid; I give to my daughter Rachael Paradise one dollar, believing that, she can do very well, without any more, through her Sally Reasons. I give five dollars. To my son Barnabas.

Boyle who has always been kind to me. I give my negro boy Sam and my grey fellow Peter, to my daughter Nancy, I give my nego or girl Amanda, to my daughter Patsy. I give my negro girl Matilda, to my daughter Lou, I give my negro boy Jacob, to my daughter Louisa, I give my mulatto girl Anna, and my mulatto girl Edga, to my children and further I give to my daughters Lou Barnabas and my daughters my negro woman Effy, and her increase if any, to be equal with them, that is my daughters Nancy, Patsy, Lou and Louisa, which said negro is to remain with my daughters last above named, for their use and benefit, or if any one or more of them shall marry, then the negro woman Effy to remain being the exclusive use of them that remain unmarried during their lives, and then to be, equally divided at the death of those that may remain unmarried, between the heirs of those who may have married of any, not to go, to the balance of my children, in equal proportions. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and affixed my seal, this 24th December 1830.
