

128 *Frederick Conaway Will*

State of Tennessee. Clinch County. December 1st 1835. In the name of God amen
 I Frederick Conaway being in a low state of Health but of sound mind & memory &
 being desirous to dispose of my worldly goods before I die. 1st after paying all my just
 debts I give to my loving wife Minnie all my land & plantation to support her natural
 life or widowhood & do also give her all my household & kitchen furniture. I also give her
 a choice Cow & calf & I give her my boy more & a choice sow & pigs also eight hundred
 pounds of pork & 30 barrels corn for her support until she makes a crop also
 1000 pounds tobacco & 200 bundles oats also all my stock of sheep & Poultry I
 give her my family Bible all the above named property I leaving my wife
 during her widowhood or lifetime & if she marries all the above property to
 be sold & equally divided among my lawful heirs. Item the 2nd I have
 portioned off my loving son John & wife with each a horse & cow & calf & furniture which is
 all they are to have during their mother life or widowhood. Item 3rd I have also given my
 loving son Dewey a horse equal to John & wife's he is also to have a bed of furniture & cow
 & calf equal to the others or \$60 in lieu of the cow & calf. Item 4th I have also
 portioned off my three eldest daughters I give my loving daughter Matilda
 a bed & furniture Cow & calf sow & pigs of the other two equal with her
 which is all their portion during their mother lifetime or widowhood.
 I give my loving daughter Anna Ann a bed of furniture & a cow & calf now and
 a sow & pigs when she marries. Item 6th I give my loving son Green B.
 Conaway a Gray filly of twenty dollars to make her equal to the other boys
 horses a cow & calf bed of furniture. I also give him the one fourth of the
 present Crop of corn & fodder for making of taking care of it. Item 7th
 I give my loving son Benjamin B. Conaway a bay horse cost of \$25. when he
 is 20 years of age to make his horse equal with the rest, I also give
 him a feather bed of furniture when he marries or comes of age. also
 ten dollars in lieu of a cow & calf when he comes of age or
 marries. Item 8th I heartily appoint my loving sons to act, namely
 Miles W. Conaway & Solomon P. Simpson my true & lawful Executors
 to this my last will of testament. Signed in presence of in the date

129 *Robert Moore's Will*

In the name of God amen. I Robert Moore of Clinch County Tennessee do
 (in my Common mind & memory) do make & constitute the following my last will of
 Testament. Viz. First of my goods & chattels pay my debts if any. 2nd I give to my
 wife all my property during her natural lifetime & then to return to our children
 except what I shall herein after mention. 3rd I give to my son Washington
 Franklin Moore when he comes of age or shall marry one half of the tract
 of land on which I now live one negro lad named Abby & one negro
 girl named Nannie & her increase one wagon one set Smith tools one
 horse saddle & bridle worth one hundred dollars. One fourth part
 of all the sheep hogs Cattle & farming utensils at that time.
 4th I give & bequeath to my daughter Amanda when she becomes
 age or marry one negro boy & Matilda & her increase one negro
 boy named Porterfield one bedstead bed of furniture one large
 chest of latta one fourth part of all the horses Cattle & sheep hogs
 farming tools & wagons, not named.
 5th I give to my daughter Martha Hepziba Moore when she comes of age
 marry one negro girl named Frank & one negro girl named Samp
 & her increase one bedstead bed of furniture one hereau chest of latta
 one fourth part of all the horses sheep cattle hogs & farming tools
 & wagons not before named. 6th And I constitute my wife
 an Executrix & James Fulton Esq. Executor. Given prove
 under my hand & seal on the 16th day of October in the year
 of our Lord 1832.
