But of sound mind and memory. at the 13<sup>th</sup> day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty, this my last will and testament — I leave, to my lawful and loving wife Ill, the plantation on which I now live, upon her natural life, also, the household and kitchen furniture and two feather beds and furniture, one Clay Bank, Mare and plantation tools, and one white Cow, all the hogs, belonging to the plantation, at the death of my wife I give to my son George, the plantation that is left to her, containing fifty acres, and the said man, one saddle and bridle. I also give to my son Samis, twenty five acres of land, adjoining the fifty acres on the east, I also give to my daughter Sally, one cow and three sheep, one feather Bed and furniture, one Cotton wheel, I give to my daughter Elizabeth, one Cow and three sheep, one feather Bed and furniture, one Cotton wheel, — I leave not any thing to my first Children, knowing that I gave them, a great deal more, than I have at this time, to give to those that I have had, by my last wife. which is Patsy, Susan, Murphy, Susannah, James, Mary, Murphy, my son Joseph and Aaron.
