The Last will and Testament of
Henry Kelsey deceased.

In the name of God Amen
I know all men by these presents
that I Henry Kelsey, of County of

Lincoln and State of Tennessee, being of a sound mind, and recollecting that
all men must die, do make this my last will and testament,
that I request a decent burial, and all my just debts should be paid,
my daughter Mary Street, my daughter Nancy, Robert and
son John Kelsey, and my son James Kelsey, and my daughter Elizabeth
Thomson, and my son Jefferson Kelsey, and my son Alfred Kelsey, and
my daughter, Jane Cunningham and my daughter Mandana
Yealer, and my daughter Amatis Kelsey, they have all got their
equal share, of my estate, except what may be mentioned hereafter.
John Kelsey got this share in a three hundred dollar note given for
land, this division took place on the 26th of December 1831. all that
John Kelsey and he received on the 5th January 1832. as my son
Henry Kelsey, got no share among the rest of my children I will to
him as follows, twenty six acres of land, which the mention here
stands entered in the name of Mr Street, one hundred and twenty acres
of land entered in the name of Robert Henry, one hundred and forty
acres of twelve and a half cut, land entered in my own name, also
lying on the south side of Elk River, on the waters of Red Creek.
And also one third part of a two hundred and twenty five acre tract,
of one cut land, entered in my name, beginning on the south boundary
line of Potts and Cobbs four thousand acre survey, also one negro boy,
Red, son of Hannahs, also a filly known in the family, by the name of
Blaze filly, also a good saddle if I should die before his coming of age the
land is to be rented and the negro boy to be hired out, my son Henry is to
be educated and clothed out of the rent of the land and the hire of said
boy, and if any over plus, it is to be loaned out, and at the age of twenty he is
to have full possession of all, — I also will to my son Alfred Kelsey one
third of two hundred and twenty five acres, one cut land, entered in
my own name, and also my son Jefferson Kelsey, one third of the same tract
of land, beginning on the south boundary line of Potts and Cobbs four
thousand acre survey, lying on the south side of Elk River, the rest of my
property not mentioned, is this will is to be sold, and my son James Kelsey
first to have one hundred dollars, then all my daughter is to receive one

three hundred dollars, for each of them, then the balance to be divided equal
amongst all my children —

I also have given my daughter Amatis Kelsey, one filly known in the family
of Potts and Cobbs, one cow and calf, one horse and partition, one arping table
which has not been taken away. I do appoint my sons John Kelsey and
Jefferson Kelsey Executors of this my last will and testament. In testimony
of all which I have hereunto set my hand, and affixed my seal this 5th day
January 1832

signed, sealed, published and declared
by the said testator as and for
his last will and testament, in presence,
of us, who at his request in his presence,
and in the presence of each other, have subscribed
our names, as witnesses thereto.

not to dispute in the case I have advised it, I also wish the two grants to be written
in out of the estate.

Lincoln County Court April Session 1832

The Last will and testament of Henry Kelsey was this 16th day of April
1832, exhibited in open Court for probate, and thereupon Commenced
Bailey and Elisha Tomison, the subscribing witnesses, thereby also being
first duly sworn, say they heard the said Henry Kelsey acknowledge the
same to be his last will and testament in writing and that he was at the time of
signing being of publishing and declaring the same of sound mind and
memory, which is all ordered to be & testified for recording, whereupon Com
Jefferson Kelsey one of the executors named in the will, who entered into bond,
and took the oath by law in such cases provided prescribed gave
under my hand at office in Tennesse the 18th June 1832.
