

The Occupative will of James C. Robinson  
 We S. M. Emmons and James Hopper do state that  
 the occupative will of James C. Robinson was made  
 by him on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of October 1853 in our presence  
 to which we were specially required to bear witness  
 by the testator himself in the presence of each other  
 that it was made in his last sickness in his own  
 habitation or own dwelling house where he has  
 been resident for one year or more

And the same is as follows to his wife  
 Martha he gave one bed & furniture & one bedstead  
 one Cow & calf. And every thing else he directed  
 to be sold and his just debts paid out of the same  
 and the remainder to be divided between his wife  
 Martha and her offspring he further appointed  
 Henry Robinson executor of this his last will &  
 testament

Last Will of Drury Richardson Dead

In the name of god Amen  
 I Drury Richardson do make and publish  
 this as my last will and testament hereby revoking and making  
 void all other wills by me at any time made  
 First I direct that my funeral expenses and my debts be  
 paid as soon after my death as possible out of any  
 monies that I may be possessed of or may first come  
 into the hands of my executor  
 Secondly I give and bequeath unto my son James one clay  
 bank Coll one year old this Spring  
 Thirdly I give and bequeath to my wife Priscilla all my  
 other property both real and personal and direct  
 that each of my minor heirs as fast as they arrive  
 of age receive the same as my children that are  
 married have received in Value this to be  
 proportioned by my wife as she think right and  
 equitable

Fourthly It is my desire that my property shall remain my  
 wife's during her natural life or widowhood and that  
 at her Marage or decease my Property both real and  
 personal be sold and the proceeds equally divided among  
 my lawful heirs

Fifthly & Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my  
 wife Priscilla my Executor... In testimony  
 whereof I do to this my will set my hand and seal  
 this 27<sup>th</sup> day of May 1853

 September 17 1855

 in the town of Eighteen hundred & twelve and all  
 of my stock of all kind with the Farming tools and  
 all of my household & kitchen furniture all of the  
 above named property that I have bequeathed to my  
 beloved wife to do as she pleases with and at her death  
 the same to my Last I do hereby nominate and  
 appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth Kennell  
 my executor in and whereof I do to this my  
 will set my hand and seal this 27<sup>th</sup> day of Sept 1855
