 all the children she may hereafter have, all of
 my crop of every description, my household &
 Kitchen furniture, all my farming & shop tools

and all of my stock of all kinds, except so much as
 will be necessary to be sold to pay my debts, to be sold on a
 twelve months credit; all of which, as above stated, I
 give and bequeath to my Wife Eliza during her natural
 life or widowhood, and at her death lands, Negroes &
 Stock and all the property of every description must be
 sold on a twelve months credit, and be equally divided
 among all my children then alive then and share alike
 Now if my Wife Eliza should at any time marry, it
 is my wish and desire that all my property of every
 description be sold on a twelve months credit and
 when all the moneys are collected to be equally divided
 among my children and wife share & share alike,
 my wife only to have a child's part, & do with her
 part as she wishes at her death -

Thirdly and lastly, I do hereby nominate and
 appoint Anderson C. Martin my Executor
