

The last Will and Testament of Joseph Common, Esq.

I Joseph Common, of Lincoln County, New Hampshire, do make & publish this as my last will and testament.

Item 1<sup>o</sup> I direct all my just debts and general expenses be paid or done after my death as can be conveniently done out of any money that may first come into the hands of my Executor.

Item 2<sup>o</sup> It is my will that one eighth of an acre of ground upon the place that I now own, including the ground where my wife is buried be appropriated & set apart for a family burial ground, not to be subject to sale or to be used for any other purpose but a family grave yard.

Item 3<sup>o</sup> I direct that my Executor hereinafter named will have a good & substantial stone wall built around my wife's grave.

Item 4<sup>o</sup> It is my will that my Executor sell the tract of land that I now own to the highest bidder (except that reserved for a family grave yard as soon after my death as practicable up on the premises on a credit of one & two years, after giving thirty days notice of the time place and terms of sale, he will take bond & good security for the purchase money, and retain a lien upon the same upon until that money is paid).

Item 5<sup>o</sup> It is my will that my Executor divide the proceeds of the sale of said land as well as any other money that may be belonging to me after paying my debts & funeral expenses as aforesaid equally among my nine children except in this that I want my daughter Sarah to have fifty dollars more than my Sons. In making such division my Executor will bring into consideration the advancements hitherto made to some of them said advancements will be hereafter mentioned.

Item 6<sup>o</sup> I do hereby constitute my son Hiram S. Common, trustee for my daughter Sarah wife of Simpson Buchanan.

It is my will that her portion of the proceeds of the sale of the said land & other means to which she would be entitled to under the fifth clause or item of this my will be paid over to said Hiram S. Common as her trustee, and when paid over he will bear the same out from year to year during the life of my said daughter Sarah. The interest accruing upon her portion he will pay over to her from time to time as she may require the same, & at her

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death. It is my will that my said son Hiram S. Common pay the principal sum over to my said daughter Sarah's children in equal proportions.

Item 7<sup>o</sup> I do hereby constitute and appoint my son-in-law William Beverly trustee for my daughter Elizabeth wife of said William Beverly. It is my will that her portion of the proceeds of the sale of land & other means to which she would be entitled to under the fifth clause or item of this my will be paid over to said William Beverly as her trustee & when paid over to said Beverly he will bear the same out from year to year during the life of my said daughter Elizabeth, the interest accruing upon her portion he will pay over to her from time to time as she may need the same, and after death it is my will that said trustee will pay the principal sum over to my said daughter Elizabeth's children in equal portions.

Item 8<sup>o</sup> I have heretofore made the following advancements to my Son John H. Common, one horse worth one hundred dollars, one cow & calf worth ten dollars, & one sheep worth five dollars, making in all advanced to him one hundred & fifteen dollars.

To my son Hiram S. Common, one bay mare worth eight dollars.

To my son George S. Common, one bay mare worth eighty dollars.

To my son Andrew S. Common, one bay mare worth eighty-five dollars.

To my son Charles S. Common, one horse worth forty dollars.

To my son Francis H. Common, one horse worth one hundred dollars.

Lastly I do hereby nominate & appoint William M. Farnwalt Executor to this my last will & testament. I witness this hereunto set my hand & seal this February 21<sup>st</sup> 1858,
