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Last and testament of Richard Wyatt please
Remember 24th 1855
I Richard Wyatt do make and publish this as my last will and testament
hereby revoking and making void all other wills by me at any other
time made being of sound mind and memory and of full age and
having that it is appointed for all ones to die and after that
the judgment I do therefore at my dissolution recommend my
soul to God who gave it and to the saving grace of the Lord
Jesus Christ the saviour of sinners to be redeemed from in by
the blood of his cross and my body to be buried in a christian
manner then concerning my worldly substance which God has
given me as my portion after paying my funeral expenses and
all my just debts I direct that the balance of my property be
disposed of in the following manner first I give and bequeath
to the reformed Presbyterian Church of North America one
hundred dollars to be divided as follows forty dollars to the
congregation in Lincoln County Tennessee thirty dollars to be
applied for the benefit of the missionary cause in North America
twenty dollars for the benefit of the missionary cause in America
secondly I give and bequeath to Thomas Wyatt my son the
tract of land which he now lives on and the fifteen acres on the
ridge by him passing to Sarah Maston my daughter three hundred
dollars, thirdly I direct that the land I now live on divided to
me by Wilson and Pinson be divided beginning at the north
west corner of a fifty acre tract of land that I sold to John Wyatt
running north to the Creek having the big big spring east of
the line thence with the meandering of the Creek to a sycamore
tree in a northern course to a walnut in a smed hole in
the lot above the house having the spring I now use wally out
of on the west side of said line thence north west to the middle
of the tract thence north to the north boundary line I give and
bequeath all the land east of said line to my son John Wyatt
by him passing to my daughter Elizabeth Mast one hundred and
twenty five dollars, fourthly I give and bequeath to my daughter
Elizabeth Mast, two notes of a hundred dollars each I now have
in my possession on Rhoda Mast deceased and a receipt of one
hundred and ten dollars to satisfy a judgment against Rhoda
Mast that I passed to John Lamer, also a deed of trust that I
have against the estate of Rhoda Mast deceased making in
all four hundred and thirty five dollars, fifthly I give and
bequeath to my son John Wyatt one half of

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 Most of the land before mentioned including the dwelling house
 I now live in and the kitchen I now use also the stable and the
 crib that I use and all my hery cows, sheep and sheep and all
 my house hold and kitchen furniture, I give and bequeath
 to my son William Wyatt one half of the land most of the land
 before mentioned including the house, now live in and the
 kitchen corn crib stable and barn he now uses I wish that
 I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Morton one hundred
 dollars making in all four hundred dollars including the three
 hundred dollars that Thomas Wyatt has to pay to her, I wish
 I give and bequeath to my daughter Margaret Swilerton two
 hundred dollars in money and three notes on Robert Swilerton
 deceased one for fifty dollars one for fifty five dollars and
 one for twenty five dollars making in all three hundred and
 thirty dollars, I direct that if there is not enough so
 that my daughters Margaret Swilerton Elizabeth West and
 Sarah Morton cannot receive the amount mentioned to each
 they shall each have an equal part and if there is more
 it shall be equally divided between them three, I wish I
 give and bequeath to my daughter Jane Wyatt my family bible
 and the balance of my books to be equally divided between all
 my children, I have divided my affections among you the best I
 could without partiality or affection and now my dear
 children fare not out among favorites if any of you is
 wounded lay that to my charge for a little more God
 blessing is more and best to than thousands of gold with
 his cross but strive earnestly for the inheritance of God
 might hands where I hope he shall all of you meet to share forth
 the praises of redeeming love and that this may be our hope, which
 God in his infinite mercy may grant I mean
 lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint Thomas Wyatt and
 John Carey my ex. cutors In witness where of I do to this
 my will set my hand and seal. This the 14th day of December

above mentioned heirs should die without issue the dona-
tions shall fall to the remainder of above mentioned heirs to
be distributed equally. I nominate W. E. Milnor, Thos M.

to sell my land based on a credit of one two & three years; they
dividing it or sell all together as they think best.
