To my son David I give and bequeath three negro children Jimmy Foster and Peter one young bay horse and one swaggon; and also at the death of my wife the negroes January & Rachel To my grand son Joseph Cobbs junior son of David I give the North West quarter section of land being part of the farm on which I now reside

To my Son Joseph Cobbs I give and bequeath two negroes Richmond and Peter

To my grandson David Cobbs Son of Joseph Cobbs at the death of my wife the South east quarter of land part of the farm on which I now reside.

To my Daughter Mary Cox wife of John Cox I give and bequeath a negro boy Moses and at the death of my wife a negro woman Ann (the increase of said negro Ann if she should have children to be equally divided among ~~William~~ Rizzy Williams & Joseph of my said Daughter Mary Cox) Also I bequeath to my said Daughter Mary Cox one half of the house hold furniture at her mothers decease.

To my Daughter Rizzy wife of Samuel Finston I give and bequeath one negro woman Sydney one gray mare and carry all also one half of the house hold furniture at her mothers decease.

To all my children namely David & Cobbs John Cobbs Joseph Cobbs Rizzy Finston and Mary Cox I hereby ratify and confirm whatever lands negroes or other property I have heretofore given to them.

To my grand daughters Ann and Harriet Daughters of John Cobbs I give and bequeath fifty dollars each and also one good feather bed each. And to my grand children John B. Jelut and Angeline Cobbs children of my son John Cobbs I give five dollars each. Any stock farming implements or other property not mentioned in this my will or which may remain after my wife shall have made her selection shall be equally divided among all my children by the Executors.

Whatever notes or outstanding debts may be due to and at my decease shall be collected by my Executors and after paying the foregoing money legacies shall if there remain any balance divide it equally among all my children.
