Wm. M. Leav's will

In the name of God, I, William Maclean of Lincoln County and State of North Carolina being at this time and for some years past under bodily infirmities and believing that those infirmities are of such a nature that they never can be removed and that they may terminate my present existence, at some time when I might not be expecting it at this time May 18th 1836 feeling myself possessed of a sound disposing mind and memory recognizing my family and each of them and at the same time recognizing my property, I do think it to be just and right to dispose of the same in the following manner and form, To my beloved wife Mary D. Maclean I give and bequeath to her while she lives her maintenance on the tract of land whereon we now live, this is to include for her use the surplus if any, which may arise from the products of the farm all of which all of which she is to hold in her own right and dispose of as she may think proper I also will and bequeath to her the following named negro men & negro women, negro men, Solomon, Martin, Ned and Abram, negro women Daphney, Beth and Amy These I will her to hold during her natural life and at her death to dispose of as she may think proper amongst our children together with their increase I do hereby will and bequeath to her all the farming utensils necessary for the amusements of the above named servant, this is to comprehend a sufficient number of horses not less than three plow, horn, mallets, shovels, spades, iron wedges axes, plow tatters, waggon & cart all of which she is to have the use of she making the necessary repairs during her natural life and at her pleasure then to dispose of them, Disposal of my books or library, I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary D. Maclean, Scott's family bible (William Maclean) the edition which we now have, famous sacred history, famous sermons in four volumes as we now have them, M. Whorters sermons in two volumes as we now have them, Isaac Ambrose looking unto Jesus in one volume, songs works as we now have them Pishers catechism & the confession of faith as adopted by the presbyterian church together with Brown's Dictionary of the Bible & Brierly's Theological Dictionary and my will is she may own and possess these books

with a full right in herself to lend or borrow any of them among our children as she may think proper I do further give and bequeath to her all our kitchen furniture as it now is or may be at my death this is designed to comprehend all the pots, pot racks, ovens, pans, grid irons, shovels, tongs and huns and every other articles which we use at this time in the kitchen or may be in it at my decease, Disposal of my Western lands among my daughters To my beloved daughter Elizabeth Maclean alias Eliza J. Campbell To my beloved daughter Violet M. M. Leav, for some time formerly Violet M. Leav To my beloved daughter Rebecca Isabella Maclean and to my beloved daughter Mary Margaret Maclean to each of the above named daughters I give and devise two hundred acres of my lands lying in Robertson County West Tennessee on the waters of Buzzard Creek my will is that these legacies be laid off on the south end of my tract beginning at the extremity of my Southern land and extending Eastward for complement in such a manner that each of the legacies mentioned to my daughters shall be laid off adjoining each other in the order they are above mentioned and their northern boundary be Buzzard Creek or some of the branches thereof Disposal of my Western land among my sons, to my beloved son John D. Maclean I will and devise three hundred acres of the above mentioned tract lying on the North side of Buzzard Creek to commence at the second corner of the above tract and extend South to Buzzard Creek is as to include the small improvements wherein Harrison now lives from the second corner this legacy is to be laid off to the Eastward of my Western land and to extend to Buzzard Creek, To my son Richard Dobbie I plight Maclean I will and devise to him three hundred acres of the above mentioned tract to extend Eastward on my Western land for complement so that its Southern boundary may be upon Buzzard Creek or some of its branches, To my son William Baynes Maclean I will and devise three hundred acres of the above mentioned tract of land to be laid off adjoining the above legacies of his brother John D. Maclean & Richard D. Maclean and to extend from my Western land on the (Maclean) North to Buzzard Creek on the South or some of its branches, To my son Alexander Augustus Maclean

I will and devise two hundred acres of the above ^{mentioned} tract of land to begin on my western end to adjoin the above legacy to be laid off to the East of them and extend to the South as far as Buzzard Creek or to some of its branches so as if possible to include some constant stream of water, To my son Thomas Brumard Maclean I will and devise two hundred and fifty acres of the above mentioned western tract of land to be laid off to the Westward of the above mentioned legacy and if possible to extend to Buzzard Creek or to some of its branches so as to include some constant stream of water, Disposal of my land in Lincoln County North Carolina, To my son Alexander Augustus Maclean I will and devise all that part of the tract of land which I bought of William Spruill & Co that lies North and West of the lane as it now stands the devise is to include land on each side of Little Catfish Creek with the buildings and improvements thereon except as hereafter will be excepted, To my son Thomas Brumard Maclean all the remaining part of the above mentioned tract of land which lies on the South and East side of the lane about mentioned with the privilege of occupying a part of the barn which is placed on that part of the tract devised to his brother Augustus (Mr. Maclean) also I will the said Thomas B. Maclean the privilege of cutting timber for rails & other necessary improvements of the contiguous part of the tract of land on which I now live but my will is that this privilege shall cease both as it refers to the barn about mentioned and also as to the cutting timber of my tract of land contiguous to it when he shall divert himself or tell to this land and invest it in another form To my son Robert Hamilton Grayham Maclean I will and devise all that tract of land wherein I now live after the death of his mother free from any incumbrances except that of his brother Thomas cutting and using necessary timber off the contiguous parts while the above legacy remains in the possession of the said Thomas B. Maclean, Disposal of my negroes not before mentioned, To my son Richard Dobb Spaight Maclean I will and bequeath my negro boy Simon, To my son Alexander Augustus Maclean

I will and bequeath my negro boy Peter, To my son John Davidson Maclean I will and bequeath my negro boy Joseph, to my son William Bayard Maclean I will and bequeath my negro boy Joseph, To my son Thomas Brumard Maclean I will and bequeath my negro boy Henry, To my son Robert Hamilton Maclean I will and bequeath my negro boy Julius, To my daughter Eliza Jackson Maclean also Eliza J. Campbell I will to her in trust of her brother Richard D. Maclean & John D. Maclean agreeable to a written contract heretofore made my negro woman named Betie, which the said Eliza now has in possession, on the trust aforesaid with her increase if any to be held by her in the same manner as the negro Betie is held, To my daughter Violet Wilson Maclean I will and bequeath my negro girl named Melinda which she has for several years had in possession
 Mr. Maclean

also a negro girl named Lena will'd to her by her grandmother Violet Wilson Davidson I conveyed to her in trust by her Grandfather John Davidson, I also will and bequeath to her a Bureau which I have had made for to replace one which has been sold from her I also recommend to my wife to furnish her bedding equal to that which has been sold on like occasion from her, To my daughter Rebecca Isabella Maclean I will and bequeath to her my negro girl Lena and a Bureau which I have had made for her together with a horse or mare to be purchased by my executor providing I do not furnish her with a horse or mare before my death and my will is that she shall be furnished with two beds with the usual furniture of beds such as her mother can prepare and which may not be prepared at my death but in case of her mother's death before these articles are provided my will is that they shall be provided by my executor out of the balance of my estate not particularly willed, To my daughter Mary Margaret Maclean I will and bequeath to her my negro girl named Rod together with a Bureau which I have had made for her and my will is that she be furnished with in every respect as now pointed out for her sister Rebecca, my negro girl Abby & my negro girl Philis together with the increase of my negroes I bequeath to my wife to be at her disposal amongst our children as she may think proper Disposal of books not otherwise heretofore mentioned To my son Richard D. S. Maclean I give and bequeath Marshall's life of Washington Latimer memoirs of Jackson campaigns together

with the atlas belonging to each work. Montague works Smith
 wealth of nature the Federalist (Mr. Madison) and Blanton
 commentaries these books are well'd as they are now to be
 found in my library. To my son Alexander Augustus
 Maclan I will and bequeath Gordon's history of the
 American Revolution, the Abby Raynolds history of the
 British settlements and trade in North America Shereby
 travels through Greece together with the Atlas Thiers's
 longing and Heywood's manual. To my son Thomas Charles
 I will and bequeath Robinson's history of Scotland Ramsay's
 history of South Carolina Byrnes's travel & Potter's Britain
 To my son Robert Hamilton Gray and Charles I will &
 bequeath Robertson's history of Charles the fifth McHenry's
 voyages in North America the Present state of liberty in
 Malta this being an extract from several authors. To my
 daughter Eliza I bequeath I will & bequeath to her my
 much esteemed set of Spectator. To my daughter Violet
 M. Maclan I give and bequeath to her all the works of Buffon
 as they are now to be found in my library also Harveys
 meditations To my daughter Rebecca I. Maclan I give
 and bequeath Thompson's works complete as they now
 stand in my library To my daughter Mary M. Maclan
 I give and bequeath Keene's plays, Franklin's works as they
 are now to be found in my library together with a treasury
 on virtue & happiness. Disposal of books medical, surgical
 chemical botanical, philosophical and astronomical together
 with all my authors on the dead languages I will & bequeath unto my two sons John D. Maclan and
 William B. Maclan in the following manner viz. that
 the thirteen volumes of the Barron Van Senator's commen-
 taries on Boethius Aphorisms shall complete one
 to (Mr. Maclan) and the 3 volumes of the works of Morgan
 re shall complete another lot the other books of the
 above description I will that they be arranged in lots
 as nearly equal in volume as they can be estimated
 these lots are to be numerical and corresponding numbers
 put into a hat or box and drawn by my two sons
 John D. Maclan and William B. Maclan my son
 John is required to draw first & he & his brother William
 are required to proceed drawing alternately until
 the whole number are drawn & should it so happen
 that there remained an odd number the lot cor-
 responding to this number shall be equally divided
 between them. Disposal of my miscellaneous works

of which there are a great number my will is that each of
 my children may make choice of any of these books
 they may wish to retain that these should be valued to
 them that this valuation shall be taken into consideration
 in the dividend of these books those books which may not be
 disposed of in this way my will is that my executors shall
 sell them at public sale vendue and the money arising from
 this sale be equally divided amongst my children. Disposal
 of my notes and book accounts which are estimated to be
 worth eight or nine thousand dollars To my son John
 D. Maclan I will & bequeath one fourth of them as they
 may appear upon my books at my decease. To son William
 B. M. Maclan two hundred dollars out of the balance
 To my son Richard D. Maclan two hundred dollars To my
 son Alexander M. Maclan two hundred dollars To my
 son Thomas B. Maclan two hundred dollars and the
 balance to belong to my wife Mary D. Maclan except so
 much of it as may be necessary to fill the legacy left
 to my daughter which may not be filled at my death
 (Mr. Maclan) and also excepting so much as may be
 thought prudent and necessary to add to the education
 of my son Robert in the necessary branches of a common
 english education my will is in the dividend of the
 notes and book accounts heretofore referred to that the
 spend & desperate accounts & notes be decided and
 equalized in proportion to the dividends heretofore settled
 and mentioned my debts at this time are but very few
 but I desire my executors to pay all my legal debts
 speedily and honestly I do hereby nominate and appoint
 my two sons Richard D. Maclan and John D. Maclan
 executors of this my last will and testament and I do
 hereby bind my executors and my children generally
 to pay particular attention to the support of their mother
 in her now declining years so that the property bequeathed
 to her may be so managed as to afford her a com-
 fortable and easy support during her life. Mr. Maclan
 I will that I shall be buried near my father and
 mother, that a small monumental stone be placed at
 their head and another of the same description placed
 at mine merely to mark the spot my body is laid. This
 will is deliberately written by myself on eight pages
 each page of which I have signed considering and adopted
 as my last will and testament. Wm. Maclan

January 15th 1838 Since the date of the above last will and testament I have acquired some property in consequence of which I find it necessary to make the following bequest viz in Lieu of the land in Sumpter which I gave to my son Richard Dobbie Spaight Maclain I do give and bequeath unto him the tract of land lately occupied by Joseph Barth known and called the Mill Creek two hundred acres with one half the interest in the Grist Mills now nearly completed & the other half of the Grist & saw mills I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Edward Maclain with the necessary interest in the land upon which the works are erected. And in consequence of the death of my beloved daughter Eliza I give and bequeath to each of her children viz Violet, George and William that land that is, willed to her with one additional hundred acres off the same tract as before described making one hundred acres to each child and the books intended for her as the children could not for many years make any use of them I will and bequeath the same to be equally divided between my daughters Rebecca & Mary To my sons John & Augustus & William I give and bequeath the residue of my lands in the State of Sumpter reserving and bequeathing unto my son Thomas two hundred acres fifty being taken off the share as above willed in consequence of giving him the one half of the Grist and saw mills my Maclain lands will then stand thus two hundred acres to my daughter Violet, two hundred to my daughter Rebecca two hundred acres to my daughter Mary & three hundred acres to Violet, George & William children of my late daughter Eliza making nine hundred acres and to my son Thomas two hundred acres and to my sons John, Augustus and William the residue including three hundred which was bequeathed to my son Spaight Maclain and the fifty acres deducted from the share as before willed to Thomas as above stated after giving the one hundred acres to share off the children of my daughter Eliza and in consequence of a settlement with my son J. D. Maclain that part of the before willed will as gave him one fourth of the debts outstanding at my death is hereby cancelled and revoked I do hereby appoint my friend Daniel M. Fowmy sole executor of this my last will and testament hereby revoking

and cancelling that part of the foregoing will which appointed my sons Richard Dobbie Spaight M. Maclain and John Maclain Executors. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day above written

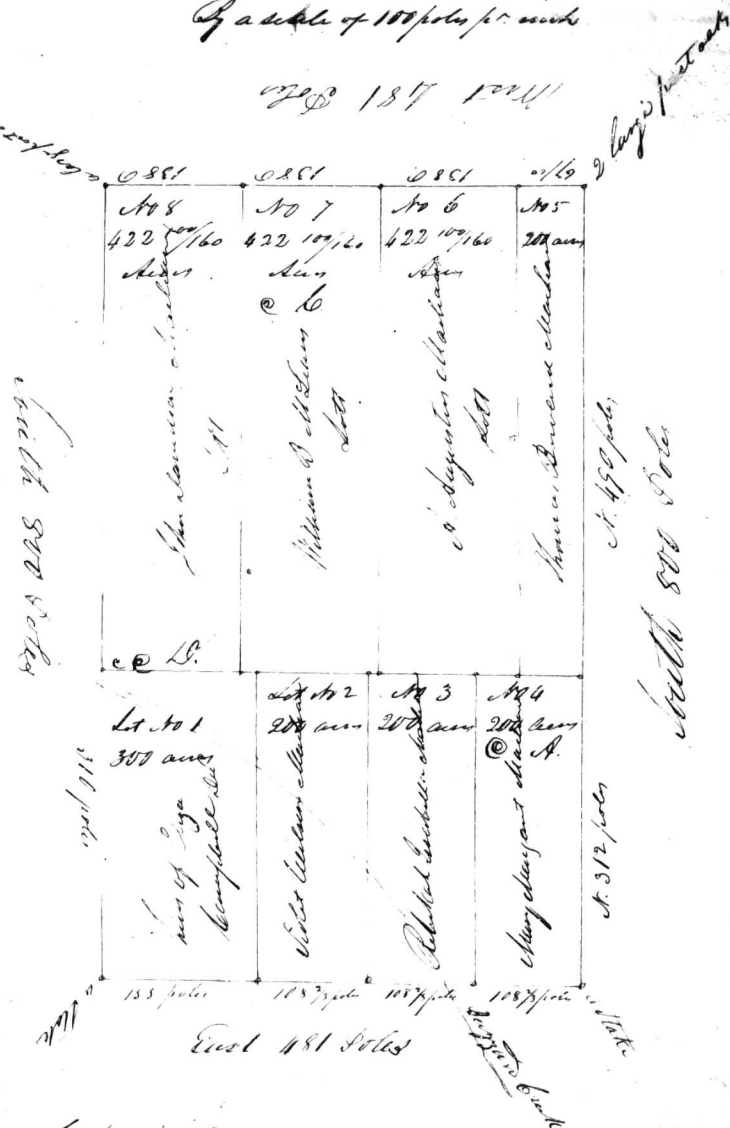

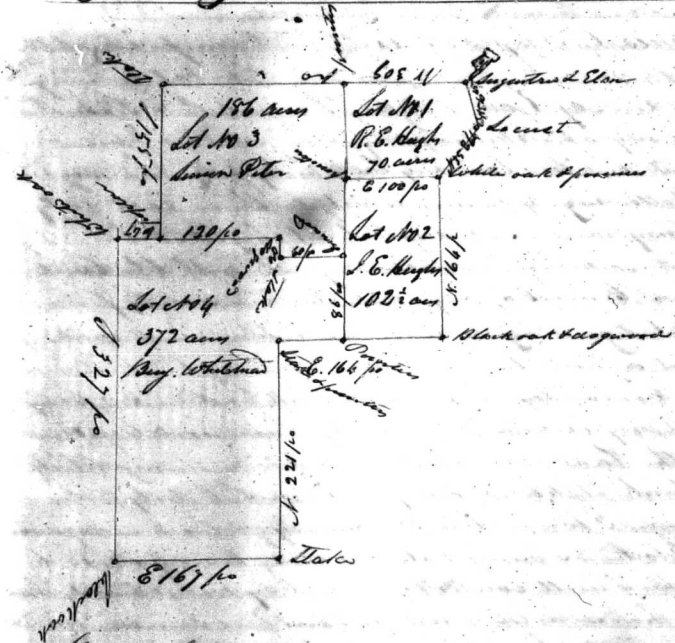
