

Last will & Testament

Charles E. Carter dec'd. Testated Oct. term 1889.

In the name of God Amen.

I Charles Edwards Carter, being of sound mind and disposing memory do make and publish this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills by me heretofore made.

First: I give my Soul to God who gave it, and my body to the dust from whence it came.

Second: I will and direct that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid out of my estate, as soon as practicable after my decease.

Third: I will and direct that all my land be sold by my Executor hereinafter named, to the best advantage, and after the payment of my debts as herein before provided, I will and direct that my Executor divide the proceeds of the sale of my land equal between my brother & Sisters John M. Carter, Mary A. Carter, Gillie R. Carter and George P. Carter.

Fourth: I give and bequeath to John M. Carter and George P. Carter, my wagon (two horse wagon) and my Crock, in equal proportions, and my young man Julia. I give and bequeath to my two Sisters Mary A. & Gillie R. Carter.

Fifth: I give and bequeath to Mrs R. Carter, one dollar in money, to be paid to him by my Executor out of the proceeds of my estate.

Sixth: I nominate and appoint D. J. A. Dickson my Executor to this my last will and testament.

Last will & Testament

In the name of God Amen.

I know all now by these presents: that I David E. Adams, being of sound mind, but knowing the uncertainty of life, do make this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills and testaments made by me.

I do bequeath and will, that all my just debts be paid, that I bequeath to my beloved wife Rhoda E. Adams, her lifetime, my farm or home place, lying in the 18th Civil Dist. of Sullivan Co. Tenn., and to my children at her death, the same.

I also bequeath to my wife Rhoda E. Adams, during her lifetime, and to my children at her death my farm, known as the Staunfield place lying in the 5th Civil Dist. of Sullivan Co. Tenn.

I also bequeath to my wife Rhoda E. Adams, all my personal property, goods and chattels.

I also direct and empower my wife Rhoda E. Adams, to execute to Elijah C. Barnes his heirs or assigns, a warranty deed to a certain tract or parcel of land containing two and one fourth acres, more or less, which I bargained and sold to the said Elijah C. Barnes, the same having been paid for by the said Elijah C. Barnes, the said tract or parcel of land lying in the 18th Civil Dist. of Sullivan Co. Tenn. and adjoining the lands of John Booth and the said Elijah C. Barnes, the same being a part of and adjoining the home place. It is my will and request that my wife Rhoda E. Adams be and is hereby appointed Executor of my will and testament.
