

Lask Hill and Testaments

Francis Coleman Deed.

I Francis Coleman being  
at no small part of the uncertainty of human life and being  
desirous to arrange my temporal affairs and being  
of sound mind and disposing memory do publish make  
to declare this to be my last will and testament hereby  
witnessing and making void all former wills by me at  
any time made.

First. I desire it is my will that after my decease  
all my just debts and my funeral expenses be first  
paid out of any money which I may die possessed of  
or that may first come to the hands of my executors or  
representatives.

Second. It is my desire and I so wish that my wife -  
Sarah Coleman shall have and hold all my lands which  
I may die seized and possessed of during her life  
and it shall be so held by her to the intent that she  
may be able to keep up the family which will be left  
under her care.

Third. It is my will that my said wife shall have &  
hold for her use & for the family all my personal  
property of every kind consisting of household & kitchen  
effects, farming implements, stock of every kind, all  
money on hand, all notes & accounts that may be due  
me at the time of my decease. It is my desire & will  
that my said wife Sarah Coleman shall have all the  
fore mentioned personal property for her use & the use  
of the family & up so much as may be necessary to  
pay all my just debts, my funeral expenses, and  
the expenses necessary to the recording & Administering  
this my will.

Fourth. It is my will that after the death of my wife  
Sarah Coleman the lands that I may die seized &  
possessed of & which is set apart to her during her  
life. Shall be sold and the proceeds of the sale shall be  
equally divided with my children making no distinction.  
Lastly I hereby appoint John J. Goss my Executor of this  
my will.

son and his daughter have the part of the farm on which  
I now live and command as follows beginning at a point  
near at the foot or base of means creek near William  
Adams house thence a north east course with said creek  
to a stone near my stable thence up the east fork of  
Means creek to a branch stone with A. T. Gloris line line to  
a tree thence a west course with the river line  
to Mrs. D. Carriss line thence north with the old line  
to a plantation house thence north with the creek to the  
beginning containing twenty five acres to the same more  
or less. I do this to my son George Baker the distance  
of my land on which he now lies and joining the lands  
of William Adams Jane Jenkins George Boiling See  
and the land first described containing by estimation  
seventy acres to the same or less. & I nominate and appoint  
William Howell executor to attend to my business after my  
death in witness whereof I do to this my will set my hand  
and seal this the 17<sup>th</sup> day of May 1881.

### Last Will and Testament of John R. Thomas Deed.

In the name of God amen

I John R. Thomas of Sullivan County Tennessee do make  
ordain & establish this as my last will and testament  
hereby revoking all former wills by me at any time  
made.

First I give my soul to God to be disposed of according  
to his pleasure touching the property with which God  
has been pleased to bless me I dispose of it as follows.  
First I require my executors hereinafter named to have  
my remains buried in a decent & Christian like  
manner.

Second I will & direct that my executors pay my funeral  
expenses & my debts out of any money I may have  
on hand at the time of my death or if there is not  
a sufficient amount for such purpose then out of the  
first money that may come into their hands from  
any sale of my property or that they may collect  
out of the debts due me.

Third I give devise & bequeath all my estate (except as  
herein after provided) to the following named persons  
(to wit) To the children of my deceased brother Jacob  
Thomas one fifth of all my estate after the payment  
of all my debts funeral expenses & the costs of  
settling up my estate.

To the children of my brother F. S. Thomas devide me  
one fifth of my estate.

To the children of my sister Elizabeth King One  
one fifth of my estate.

To my sister Susan White wife of John R. White  
one fifth of my estate.

To my brother Sam S. Thomas & his son John D. Thomas  
one fifth of my estate to be divided as follows (to wit)  
One fourth part of said sum is to be paid by my executors  
to Sam S. Thomas & the other fourth is to be paid by
