Will of William M. Cain

I William M. Cain of the County of Sullivan and State of Tennessee do make and publish this my last will and Testament being sound in mind and memory -

1st I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Christiana all of my estate - all of my lease property of every description both accounts and notes and money the farm I now live upon being all the land I now own containing One Hundred and thirty nine Acres & 3/4 be the same more or less - Contained in several Deeds provided she never marries (during her natural life time)

2nd at the death of my said wife Christiana it is my will and desire that all my children hereinafter named shall have equal shares of my estate; that is, to say, I want my four children that is at home with me to have an amount of property to make them equal with the two daughters married the balance then equally between them all. It is my desire that my children divide the land and property if the majority thinks best to do so and divide the money between them, to each of my children to-wit: Francis W. Bedford, formerly Francis W. Cain, Margaret R. Doster, formerly Margaret R. Cain, Joseph S. Cain, - Martin A. Cain, - John C. Cain & Susan C. Cain.

If my wife should ever marry again it is my will and desire that she shall have her lawful portion during her natural life time and then fall back to my lawful heirs as above named, and disposed of as above named.

I further desire and say if my wife should happen to marry and take her dower as I have heretofore specified I want my children to divide the property as first directed - as soon thereafter as convenient.

I hereby nominate and appoint my friend Martin Darr my Executor of this my last will and Testament, & booken of all former wills by me made in testimony whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name this 27th day of May 1868.

State of Tennessee Sullivan County Being a bachelor in the Religion James Crosswell being a bachelor and knowing that it is appointed for all to die, I am satisfied that from my present infirmities my stay on earth must soon close, I do now in view these things proceed to make this my last Will and Testament.

In the first place I will that the land on which I now live containing by estimation Seventeen Acres be divided so as to as to give to my son James Crosswell Twelve Acres of land including the House in which I live, and is to join William Crosswell on the West West, and on the North by the River, and east by John Witting & N. W. Vaughan, and on the East by Dr. R. Coffey, and on the West by W. V. Crosswell's land.

Now the foregoing devise is upon the condition that my son James pay the outstanding debts that I may justly owe at the time of my death.

Second - I will and declare that the residue of my land consisting of two Acres be so arranged that the five heirs namely - William Crosswell, W. V. Crosswell, Elizabeth Jones, Mary Ann Crosswell, & their three minor children of Thomas Crosswell deceased, shall be entitled to receive from the said land the sum of Ten Dollars each, which my Executor shall have power to settle by sale, unless the said five heirs can make the division of said five acres without difficulty & litigation.

Third I will that my house hold and kitchen furniture be equally divided between my son James and my daughter Mary Ann, which division they may make as may best suit their convenience.

my part to six Fathers & Mothers Names, I will and bequeath
to Immanuyl C. Spurgeon one fine Apple quilt, Carpet
white Covered & Calico Comfort & factory Blanket big
Counterpin on Bureau.

I will to Mary Spurgeon one Bed in the loft and
Woolen Comfort, Sheet & Blanket that is on the bed
and my Chest & quilt, the Roman Cross, Irish lining
Counterpin and buffaloe pillow slips, I will to Sady C.
Spurgeon, my Compass, work Covered and forward blanket
Brother Denny Counterpin a fine Sheet, Sallap Table
& work Basket, Basket of Quilt, Small Spinning wheel
and Black Cap Big Irish lining table cloth, small
I to Immanuyl C. Spurgeon the other bed, linen table cloth
small, Mary Spurgeon table cloth Sabin Staps, the hands
will to be divide equally to Joseph C. Spurgeon, daughter my
writing cards to Immanuyl C. Spurgeon.

I will to Elkanah Spurgeon for one Counterpin white that has the
most black in it a quilt that is squared of with red, a
white quilt Ash leaf.

I will to John Spurgeon for the
other Counterpin, I will to Susannah Spurgeon my
Ditto dress, the rest of my dresses to be divided among
his girls except one, a Brown Calico white I want
Sarah Beard to have - Susannah Spurgeon my Cooking
utensils and Cheas Bed and quilts on Comfort.

I will to Mary Rogers one towel Blanket and all the
yarn on bands - Susannah Spurgeon one parcel of Cora
Sheet for her and her girls my Big Shall for
Immanuyl Spurgeon, my white Shall for Mary Spurgeon
Flower Shall for Sarah C. Spurgeon my Books of all kinds
to Joseph C. Spurgeon my Slap Gavis one to each of the
Girls of Joseph C. Spurgeon, I will to Elizabeth J. Spurgeon
one patch on Blanket one Dress Candle sticks my Bibles
