Will of George Roller

I know all men by these presence that I George Roller of the County of  
Sullivan and State of Tennessee do make and publish this my last  
will and testament hereby revoking all making void all former  
wills by me at any time heretofore made And first I direct that my  
body be decently interred and and that my funeral be conducted  
in a manner corresponding with my estate as it hath pleased God  
to entrust me with I dispose of the same as follows

First I direct that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid as soon after my decease as possible out of the first Money that shall come into the hands of my executors from any portion of my estate real or personal. Secondly I direct that my two Sons George Roller and John Roller furnish my dear and beloved wife with all the necessarys of life during her natural life & will and bequeath to my sons George Roller and John Roller my Tract of land that I now live on to be equally divided between them and if my said Sons cannot agree in the division of said tract of land I direct that it may be done by some two or three disinterested men. I direct that my said sons pay to my daughters Mandy Barger and Sarah Mitchell and Marye & Roller and Mary B Roller fifteen hundred dollars each. I direct that my said Sons George and John pay over to Mandy and Sarah their said amounts of Money in five years after my death in the currency of the Country.

and I direct that my said Sons George and John pay one  
to my said Martha to Miller and Mary E Miller their said am-  
ounts of my in six years after they become of lawful age. I  
I direct that my two daughters that now living at home  
Martha E. & Mary E. have one horse each and their beds each  
and two Milch Cows each. I direct that Mandy Berger my  
daughter have one horse and I direct that my daughter Elizabeth  
Perringer have five dollars and I direct that my said Son  
George and John build an other house on the said plan-  
tation when it may become necessary after George shall  
have live or three years where he now lives. I have had a

considerable amount of property during the war and of my  
Executor should receive anything I direct that said amount  
of money so collected may be used to buy horses for my said  
daughters that I have directed to have horses. and I direct  
that my wife have my gray mare and that she remain on  
the plantation black I direct that my said son George use  
the money in hands for the use of the family and I further  
direct that all my personal property be left on the planta-  
tion for the use of the family now living at home to be  
used by said family as they see proper.

### Will of Nicholas Mottern

In the name of God amir

3<sup>rd</sup> of Nicholas Mottern being of sound mind and memory  
but aged infirm do make and publish this my last will  
and Testament hereby revoking all other wills by me made  
1<sup>st</sup> I will that all my just debts and funeral expenses  
shall be paid by my executor with the first money that  
comes into his hands.

2<sup>nd</sup> I will and bequeath to my son James M. Mottern  
and to my grand son James S. Mottern son of Henry Mottern  
all the land I now live on to be equally divided betwixt them  
by a guardian appointed for the said James S. Mottern  
my Grand son and my son James M. Mottern if they can  
not agree in the division of said land each shall choose a time  
most to divide said land

3<sup>rd</sup> I will that my son James M. Mottern and the guardian  
appointed for my Grand son James S. Mottern shall each  
pay one hundred and eighty dollars which two sums make  
three hundred and sixty dollars

4<sup>th</sup> I will order and say that my executor shall pay to my  
daughter Mary Jordan sixty dollars and to my son John Mottern  
sixty dollars and to my son Phillips Mottern sixty dollars  
and to my son William Mottern sixty dollars and to my  
daughter Susan Goodman sixty dollars and to my  
daughter Sarah Comley sixty dollars my executor shall  
have two years to pay the foregoing sums and to be paid

in the common paper currency of the Country  
5<sup>th</sup> I will that all my personal property of every kind shall be sold over  
Twelve months credit by my executor and when the money is collected  
to be equally divided between my heirs after legal expenses being paid  
by executor

6<sup>th</sup> and lastly I do nominate and appoint my son James W. Mottern  
my Executor to carry into effect this my last will and Testament  
and that he may do so without being held to Secuity in witness  
whereof I do subscribe at my hand and affix my seal to this my last  
Will and Testament this the 18<sup>th</sup> day of May 1868 signed and sealed  
in the presence of us

publish this my last will and Testament revoking all other wills by  
me made at my time herefore

First of Will my soul to God who gave it my body to be decently  
buried and my funeral expenses paid by executor hereafter  
named

Second of will and bequeath to my Livi Woods my wife  
Plantation one which I now reside also a tract of land amounting  
to the sum of one hundred acres more or less and  
which was granted to John Woods by virtue of an Entry  
Also one other small tract of Land amounting to the sum of  
fifteen acres Conveyed to the said John Woods by Mathias Little
