Circuit of Sullivan

In the 7th year of our Lord 1884
I, Andrew Hawthorn, being in a full and sound mind and of body
though aged in mind, and a firm believer
in the Lord Jesus Christ, assuming that
my day on earth are few, do hereby will
and bequeath all my property, both real and
personal as follows:

To my eldest son Andrew I bequeath five acres
of land to be cut off to him on the east end
of the farm at the option of my wife Sarah
and my son James the rest of the farm to my
wife Sarah until her death then to my son James
to my daughter Annie one thousand dollars
when she is twenty one years old to be paid
by my two sons equally.

To my wife I bequeath all my personal property
except one gleaming sily, which is to belong to
my daughter Annie and to be raised on the farm

until able for service. All my business to be settled
and debts to be paid by my said James out of my personal
property. James is to take of wife as long as she lives
and my daughter Annie until she marries. To my
nephew Leo I bequeath a horse and saddle when he is
twenty and years old to be bought and paid for by
my sons. All my household and kitchen furniture
I leave to the option of my wife. This being my last
Will and Testament I do hereby set my hand and affix
my seal this the 22nd of March in the year of our Lord

In the name of God - Amen

I William P. Herrin Sr of sound mind and disposing
memory do make and publish this my last Will and
Testament hereby revoking and making void all other
wills heretofore made by me.

- 1st I direct that my funeral expenses and all my debts be
paid as soon after my decease as possible out of any
monies that I am possessed of or that may come into the
hands of my executors out of my personal property.
- 2nd I wish and desire that all my personal property
shall be sold save what I shall hereafter name and
other wise dispose of.
- 3rd I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary A. D. Herrin
if she should survive me all my household and kitchen

furniture my riding Mair Dolly to her as she may please and to dispose of as she may see fit to.

4th I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Celara A. Barnes the sum of five hundred Dollars (\$500) in addition to what I have heretofore given her to pay to her by my two sons John C. Kerin and Thomas B. Kerin as I shall direct hereafter.

5th I give and bequeath to my beloved son John C. Kerin all my land lying north west of Beaver Creek and north East of Lick Branch the line to run with that of Springer and Byrds from Beaver Creek to Lick Branch with any several lines with the meanderings of Lick Branch to its intersection with Beaver Creek thence up the center of Beaver Creek to the beginning at Springer & Byrds line to have and to hold in fee simple to him and his heirs provided he shall well and truly pay to Celara A. Barnes or to her children in case of his death the full sum of Two Hundred and fifty Dollars (\$250) within two years after my decease.

6th I give and bequeath to my beloved son Thomas B. Kerin all my lands lying south west of Beaver Creek commencing at the dividing between myself and Jesse Rehta running with the center of Beaver Creek to mouth of Lick Branch thence with its meanderings to the old Walker line thence with the same and my several lines to the beginning to have and to hold to him and his heirs in fee simple unless otherwise disposed of by me provided he pay to Celara A. Barnes the sum of Two hundred and fifty Dollars (\$250) within two years after my decease.

7th I give and bequeath to Susan C. Salts the proceeds of the sales of all my personal property heretofore directed to be sold after my decease together with all monies remaining after the payment of my debts and funeral expenses in addition to what I have heretofore given her.

8th I give and bequeath to my son William Pearie Kerin all my home tract of land lying south of Beaver Creek running with the center of Beaver Creek except I reserve the right to my son John C. Kerin the privilege of placing an abutment on the opposite

bank of Beaver Creek from his land for a mill dam across said creek to have and to hold to him in fee simple provided my said son William P. Kerin shall support and maintain my beloved wife Mary A. D. Kerin during her natural life furnishing a room that she may select in my present dwelling house and to pay to her the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50) annually during her natural life.

9th I hereby appoint R. L. Cookin my executor to carry out according to law my foregoing Wishes &c provided he shall enter into bond and security as required by law. Given under my hand and seal this 2nd day of March 1883
