

Ie my son John O' King I give and bequeath that portion of my land lying North and East of the line last described as John O' English's after boundary on the one side, and the town of Bristol on the other side including all lands and lots, whether improved or unimproved that lie on the south side of main street up to the point where the rail road crosses the street, meaning being to include all houses as well as lots I may die possessed of on the the part of Beale's lying west of main street, but not crossing the rail road, I also give and bequeath to my son John O' King a tract of land in the tracts adjoining the lands of Leetham and others, conveyed to me by the heirs of George Burkhardt supposed to contain four hundred acres, I also give to John O' King my hog scales and a three acre lot which I purchased of him lying south and in the rear of what is known as the Common house.

To my son in law Joseph H. Anderson, I give and bequeath that portion of my land lying East of what is known as the Joe or white acre branch, bounded on one side by said branch then by the line of John O' King, then by the lands of Joseph H. Anderson, John O' King's Rader place and David Barker, I also bequeath to Joseph H. Anderson my traps and chains To my daughter Mallie J. Anderson, I give and bequeath my stock in the Virginie and East Tennessee Rail road, being as I think twenty six shares.

To the infant son of William D. Brown called James King I bequeath my stock in the Bennington rail road being ten shares.

To grand daughter Charlotte Wm' O' King I give and bequeath all the houses and lots I own in the Town of Bristol including the house I now live in purchased of Thomas Johnson, the house and lots purchased of W. H. Walker and Foster Colman, and a small brick house over the creek with the lots attached to it, near the Kentucky and Virginia rail road together with my house held for future, and whatever may be found on the lot including my forte piano also my library

James King senior

To the children of son James Wm' Mallie Wm' and Margaret Elizabeth Buchanan and John Buchanan I give and bequeath that part of my land bordering on the Town of Bristol and East of the rail road bounded by the town then by the rail road to Pitt, Pitt's line, then with his line and John O' King's line to the Joe or white acre branch then with said branch to David Barker's line then with his line and other to the Town of Bristol. This boundary includes the house in which my son James lives and several others. I also give and bequeath to my four grand children above named,

Children of my son James Wm' William Pittman, Margaret Mallie and Elizabeth and John Buchanan my entire stock property the extent of which will be seen by reference to the inventory concerning the same.

I direct that all my property not herein specifically divided shall be sold and the proceeds together with what money I may have on hand and monies collected for debts due me, my own debts and funeral expenses being first paid shall be disposed of as follows. $\frac{1}{2}$ One hundred dollars to be paid to my daughter Margaret English One hundred dollars to my former servant Mallie - and fifty dollars to my house maid Amanda. The balance left after these payments to be divided equally between my grand sons sons of my daughter Sarah Ann, Robert O' King, Mallie King and Joseph O' King I hereby constitute and appoint my son John O' King and my son in law John O' English my Rightful Executors to settle my hand and seal this 16th day of March 1857.

And on behalf of John O' King one of the Executors herein named who took the oath of an Executor and together with James Pittet his security entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of five hundred dollars conditioned as the law directs. A certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate of the said will in due form.

paying himself for his trouble to keep the remainder and use it for
purchasing necessities for my children as they have needs. Item 4^d I
desire that my horse and other cow and sheep and all other property
be kept and used by my seven children as necessary. Lucy along
with the rest provided she does not again take up with her husband
but if she does, she is to have no part in said property
