Will of Joel N. Barker.

State of Tennessee, Sullivan County, July the 8th, 1869.

I, Joel N. Barker this Day being in sound mind and disposing memory do make my last Will, and Testament. First of all, I bequeath my soul to God who gave it. Secondly - as to my earthly estate

real and personal after all my just debts and funeral expenses is paid the remainder will be a tollable sum, and it shall be equally divided betwixt my wife Sarah A. Barker and my two sons Wilson N. Barker and James M. Barker, with this exception the property and some money that my wife brought with her, and also some household furniture that she has got and made shall belong to her forever. But my personal property shall belong to my two sons Wilson & James, and I appoint both of my sons to administer upon my estate and sell the personal property and sell all upon a twelve month credit, the purchasers to give bond and good security. And after the money comes due and collected my sons shall give to my daughter Nancy Lyon, fifty dollars out of my debts due and personal property, when sold my just debts shall be paid out of the proceeds.

Codicil to above Will.

Sullivan County - Tennessee, August the 9, 1869.

I meditating about my Will, looking at the distance of my son Wilson G. Barker and his crowd of business, and then looking to the situation and business of my son, James M. Barker, I believe that they would not want to divide up my estate - neither do I think that it would suit them. Then on this consideration,

I appoint my friend William Kallenmire, my Administrator, to settle after my death, all of my unsettled business, as I believe him to be not only an honest man, but fully competent. And to release both of my sons, and I make this a codicil or a Supplement to my Will.
