Municipal Will of Stephen Styke who died in
Sullivan County Tennessee May 6th 1865,

I will that after my death and my funeral expenses are all
paid that A.C. Becker whom I am now living shall all my property consisting
of wells and accounts, five notes Executed by Mr Bushong one of a \$300,
the other for \$1000 payable in goods with a credit of \$200 both received
since the close of the war, accounts on various persons for Blacksmithing
Mr Becker is to take good care of me while I live and see that I am
decently buried when I die,

Sullivan County I after being duly sworn state that Mr Stephen Styke
stated to them on five days before he died and during
his last sickness that he had given all his property to A.C. Becker and that
said Becker was to take care of him during his life and at his death
buried & affiant would now for testes give to Mr Becker his Books &
papers and heard him say at the same time that Mr Becker was to have them
and all his other property, when he Styke died Affiant further stated
that Mr Becker was in his right & proper mind at the time he made the
above statement to them.

Will of John Cope.

State of Sullivan County of Walling West 18th 1863. Know all
men by these presents that I John Cope in view of the uncertainty of life do make
this my last will, as follows: This, I bequeath to my wife Mary Cope the entire control
of all my personal and real property during her natural life and at her death I
desire all my real estate to be equally divided among my heirs — I do hereby
declare this my last and only will and in affirmation whereof I do in the
presence of God and these witnesses, do affix my signature.

Contents of the last will that Francis Hodge made in
his lifetime while in Good Health and in Right Mind.

I give to my son Joseph Hodge the last corner of my place Beginning at a tree in the cor-
ner of the orchard running west with the crop fence a straight line to the Nolangua river
down the river to just Illinois corner at the head of the stream, thence with g. Illinois
line to a corner near the mouth of the stream, running S.E. to a poplar and sugar tree comes
from a straight line to the Beginning.

I give my son Joseph Hodge the south corner of my place Beginning at the corner
where g. In Hodges began running S. E. with a fence to the lane, thence with the
lane to a gate, & a crop fence running with said fence between a little field
and a meadow, thence with the old original lines to the Nolangua river down the number
of the river to the dividing line. — I give the balance of my land to my two sons
after Elizabeth & Mary Hodge during their life time, then it goes to my grand
son John Calvin Hodge after their death. My son Joseph Hodge has to pay my
son Josiah Hodge one hundred dollars. After my death Wife is head and tail
the 10th October 39th 1865.
