The last will and testament of Richard Yockley

I Richard Yockley, of the County of Sullivan and State of Tennessee in view of the uncertainty of the present life being of sound mind and memory do this day make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following hereby revoking all former wills by me made that is to say my soul to God who gave it and my body to be buried at the Baptist Church at Muddy Creek in the County and State aforesaid written together with

my wife Hannah Yockley next my will is that all our funeral and burial expenses to be paid and all our just debts out of our property after our death.

After my just debts and funeral expenses are paid, to my wife and desire that our beloved son James W. Yockley and our beloved son Benjamin E. Yockley have each five Dollars given to them when the property is sold. I will and bequeath to my beloved daughter Sarah D. wife of James White five Dollars at the time above stated. As to my remaining three daughters viz Margaret W. Mary, Elizabeth W. Yockley, for and in consideration of their services to me and my dear wife their filial care and regard for me, I will and bequeath unto

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thus all the real remainder or residue of my property of what kind soever both of real estate, as land and stock or movable property to be equally divided between them, which several legacies shall be apportioned to my several heirs above named at the time aforesaid.

I hereby further appoint as my sole Executor my beloved son Jacob B. Yockley. Given under my hand on the 17th of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty two

Will of J. Curtains Bleds

In the name of God Amen, I John Curtains of the County of Sullivan and State of Tennessee being in perfect health of body and of sound mind and memory and understanding blessed be God for the same, but considering the uncertainty of this transitory life do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following to wit, Principally and first of all I commend my immortal soul into the hands of God who gave it and my body to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian like manner and as to such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I give and bequeath of in the following manner.

First It is my desire that my debts and funeral expenses

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be paid out of my personal property, secondly, I give and bequeath to my loving wife a sufficient support out of my real estate during her natural life also one negro boy named Willard, and one horse and saddle, four beds and furniture and Cupboard and furniture and lattice Chair Chest and to occupy at least one room in the house, which property she is to dispose of as she thinks proper.

Thirdly I give and bequeath to my slip daughter Nancy Johnson and her heirs one negro boy named Washington. Fourthly I give and bequeath to my grand son John Johnson son of Benjamin Johnson the lower end of my plantation beginning at a corner on David Davidson's line thence a north west corner with Benjamin Johnson's line to a Chestnut Corner in the field north of the Island road thence the same direction until it strikes Charles line, also one negro boy named Jack. Fifthly I give and bequeath to my grandson Walter Johnson of Benjamin Johnson, one negro boy named Henry.

Sixthly I give and bequeath to my daughter Ellen Johnson all the my lands at the upper east end of my plantation to run with the line above described. Seventhly I give and bequeath to my grand daughter Susan Johnson daughter of Benjamin Johnson one negro boy named Bedwells.

Eighthly I give and bequeath to my grand son Walter Johnson of Johnson one negro boy named Jerry.

Ninthly I give to my daughter Ellen Johnson one negro man named Tom and one negro woman named Sarah. Tenthly I give and bequeath unto my son and daughter, Eliza Johnson daughter of John Johnson one horse Collic, black Saddle and saddle and one Bed and furniture. Eleventhly I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Bonkoy Five Hundred Dollars to be paid out of the proceeds of my personal property and lands after my debts are paid. Twelfthly I give and bequeath to my slip son John Johnson all my interest in a tract of land in Poyles Valley, Va. County which Landers Lieberow has brought out for.

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And lastly I appoint John Johnson son of Benjamin and Walter Johnson my Executors. I also make this my last will and Testament, revoking and making void all former wills and bequests, by me, at any time heretofore made, or executed, Ratifying and Confirming this and none other to be my last will and Testament. Witness my hand and seal this 5th day of July 1830.
