I give said property in this codicil mentioned to William R. Rutledge to indemnify him for his losses by said John L. Rutledge and the remainder thereof to the said William R. Rutledge in trust for the use of the heirs of said John L. Rutledge for their education and maintenance and in default of my heirs of John L. Rutledge to the said William R. Rutledge and his heirs forever in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 24 day of March 1849

The above will was proven in open Court Nov 7th 1853, & recorded in Book "B" pages 22, 334, and the Records having been destroyed by fire in the year 1863, at the burning of the Court House in Bloomfield, the said will was again admitted to probate in the County Court of Sullivan County and ordered to be again spread of Record.

Will of Sarah King dead

I Sarah King widow of R. H. King late of Sullivan County Tennessee do make and ordain this my last Will in words following to my son Leander E. King I give all the cash notes & all on him consisting of over two hundred dollars, all the stock of all kinds I have, my cash and one set of China cups and saucers and one set of fine plates and an array of bed and

bed stuff with its full complement of bed clothes. To my three daughters Eliza Susan and Colara I give all my wearing clothes to be equally divided among them. To my three sons William H. Samuel H. and James H. and my three daughters Eliza Stone Susan McBride and Colara Kewinmore I give my bureau my two other beds and bed clothes my table linen in short all my other property not above disposed of. To be divided equally among them in value leaving the manner of the division to be determined by my executor. And lastly I appoint David C. King my Executor with power to pay Leander E. King with the cost of the probate and execution of this Will the interest whereof I have hereto set my hand and seal Oct 1st 1867

Will of Jonathan King

In the name of God, Amen
I Jonathan King of the County of Sullivan and State of Tennessee being sick and weak, but of sound mind and memory, calling to mind the mortality of my body

and knowing that it is appointed unto all men to die, I do give, devise and dispose of such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life in the following manner and form, that is to say,

Firstly, to my beloved wife Jane King, I give and bequeath all my estate both real and personal during her natural life or widowhood. I likewise give to her the power to dispose of any property that she may think best for her support or comfort. I also give her the liberty of disposing of her beds and clothing as she may think best.

Secondly - I give and bequeath to my Nephew Samuel Hodge the plantation on which William Jones now lives, called the Sanders place with a piece of my old place, that is the hollow till above the spring where James & McCorkle gets water.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath to my Nephew Jonathan King, son of Brother William King, my old plantation on which I now live with the exception of that given to Samuel Hodge - Also I give and bequeath unto my old Nephew Jonathan King, my two negroes, that is my negro man Frank and my negro woman Urra, and all my other property of every description except such property as is hereinafter named.

Fourthly - I give and bequeath unto my two Nieces, Mary Jane Hodge & Elizabeth Hodge daughters of Frances Hodge four beds and bedding & all the cupboard ware and two bureaus.

I also direct that my Executors use the money that I have on hand to pay my just debts and burial expenses and if it is not sufficient to defray the expense that they sell any of the live stock that they may think best or the grain that is to spare & that they sell it in any way that they may think best to save expenses. All the above named legacies to receive these legacies at the death of my dear wife, or at her second marriage, or sooner if she think best. And I do hereby constitute and appoint Frances Hodge Jr. and Samuel Latture my Executors, hereby ratifying and confirming this as my will and Testament.

Will of John Vincent.

Be it remembered that I John Vincent of the County of Sullivan and State of Tennessee, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make this my last will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say after my just debts and burying expenses are paid.

First - I give and bequeath to my wife Elizabeth Vincent all my household furniture and kitchen furniture & what live stock she needs during her natural life or widowhood, and also the interest on all money or notes on interest that can be collected that I hold at my death, during her natural life or widowhood.

Secondly - I give and bequeath to my son George W. Vincent a tract of land including the plantation where said George W. Vincent now lives containing three hundred and eighty one acres be the same more or less subject to his Mother's dower - Beginning at a Hickory on a hill a corner made between Mrs & Peter Esaid on John Vincent's line and G. B. Hullo line, North forty two and a half degrees, West one hundred and ninety one poles to a stake on Latture's old patent
