Proved at March Term of the County Court 1883

I Peter A. Easley of the County of Fullerton State of Tennessee being Conscious that it is appointed unto all men once to die do make this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills and

testaments - First, I want my funeral expenses and all my just debts paid. Secondly, I will and bequeath all my interest in the old homestead on which I now live to Robert L. Easley's five sons, namely - Embree Earnest Easley - Alvin Blair Easley - Ogden Hamilton Easley - Charley Wilson Easley - Ray Hunt Easley - If any of the said boys should die without issue or before becoming of lawful age their interest shall accrue or revert to the surviving ones named above. Thirdly, I will and bequeath my farm known as the Campbell farm consisting of about fifty four acres adjoining the lands of Thomas Easley's heirs & Alford Easley's heirs. To the said children Embree Earnest Easley - Alvin Blair Easley - Ogden Hamilton Easley - Charley Wilson Easley - Ray Hunt Easley. And if any of the said boys should die without issue or before becoming of lawful age their interest shall accrue or revert to the surviving boys named above. Fourthly, I will and bequeath my farm adjoining the lands of Bickley and others consisting of about twelve acres to Susan Nelson during her natural life or as long as she chooses to live in it but if she chooses to abandon it per right to it I leave and in either case it then will I to Peter H. Easley son of Vincent T. Easley deceased. Fifthly, I will and bequeath all my homestead and kitchen furniture of every description and my books - notes and accounts together with my farming utensils two Magans horse plows to Robert L. Easley my brother also all my stock horses cattle hogs one mule cat also grain and land and property to my brother Robert L. Easley. Sixthly, I will and appoint my brother Robert L. Easley as my executor to this my last Will and Testament and do not require him to give bond or security. Signed sealed and acknowledged in the presence of us witnesses this 28th day of November 1882. W. D. Bullard

Whereas I P. A. Easley, having made and duly executed my last will and testament in writing ^{bearing} date the 28th day of November 1883 and written on this sheet of paper, I am I do hereby declare this present writing to be as a codicil to my said will and amend the same to be annexed thereto and I give as part thereof and I give to Albert L. Easley, my brother the right to sell privately or at public sale any of my personal property to pay my debts and have two years to do the same in before being forced under my will.

And I do hereby give and bequeath to J. H. Easley, my brother and my sister Emily (Easley) Davis, Nancy M. Davis, Sister Aunt Mary and the heirs of Sally Hodge, except the heirs of Elizabeth Allison and my brother Vincent L. Easley's heirs two cows and pigs or one of the old cows and one of the young cows and I want Albert L. Easley to have the other cow and pigs together what I willed him.

And I do ratify and confirm my said will (written on this sheet of paper) in every thing except where the same is hereby revoked and altered as in this Codicil signed sealed and acknowledged by P. A. Easley as for a codicil to be added to and be considered as a part of his last will and testament in the presence of us who have hereunto subscribed our names as witnesses thereto and in the presence of before and in the presence of each other this 12th day of February 1883.

Last Will and Testament of
James Rhwa.
Probated at April.
Term 1883

Be it remembered that, I James Rhwa of the County of Sullivan and State of Tennessee being of sound mind and memory at the signing and sealing of these presents, do make this my last will & testament as respects my lands in Rhwa County, State of Tennessee. I give and bequeath to my son Theodore B. Rhwa, and to his heirs and should he have no heirs of his body, to dispose of as he may see proper six hundred and forty acres of land in Rhwa County, and in the State of Tennessee, on the north side of Tennessee river beginning at a stake on the bank of the Tennessee river, over hundred poles above the mouth of Perry River then down Tennessee river crossing Perry to a stake a certain number of poles then North eighty degrees West to my back line to include six hundred and forty acres of land with the appurtenances thereof known as the Hugh Rhwa farm. I also give and bequeath to my son Theodore B. Rhwa and his heirs as above the one undivided fourth of an Island in Tennessee river near said farm said undivided fourth part begins at the lower side of the drift wood and run down Tennessee as to include one fourth of said Island. I also give and bequeath to my son Theodore B. Rhwa and his heirs as above all the upper part of the Island above the line which said Theodore B. Rhwa's one fourth part commences with the appurtenances thereof and this undivided fourth part on the upper part of said Island with the appurtenances thereof will be known as number one.

I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Rhwa and to his heirs and should he have no heirs of his body to dispose of as he may see proper six hundred and forty acres of land in Rhwa County in the State of Tennessee on the north side of Tennessee river with the appurtenances thereof known as the John Biggle farm beginning at a stake on the bank of Tennessee river the lower corner of Theodore B. Rhwa's land thence a certain number of poles down Tennessee river to a stake thence north eighty degrees West a certain number of poles to my back line to include six hundred and forty acres of land with the appurtenances thereof.

I also give and bequeath to my son Samuel Rhwa and to his heirs as above the one undivided fourth part of an Island in Tennessee river near said farm which is known as number two.

I give and bequeath to my son James Rhwa and to his heirs a certain tract of land in Rhwa County Tennessee on the north side of Tennessee river
