

Last Will & Testament
 Sarah Addie Fitzgerald
 Probated July Term 1902

I, Sarah Addie Fitzgerald, formerly Sarah Addie Easley, being of sound mind and memory, and running the wheelbarrow of life, and the certainty of death, do make and publish this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all others that may heretofore have been made.

1st I desire my funeral and burial expenses, paid as soon after my death as possible.

2nd I give, grant and bequeath to my sister Lucy McCulley and her heirs formerly Lucy Easley, all the right title, claim and interest; undivided interest to and in the home place, where my father Alfred L. Easley lived at the time of his death, and where my mother now lives, being my undivided share in said farm. But in consideration of the above gift and bequeathment I desire, and hereby request and desire that W. F. McCulley, husband of my said sister Lucy, shall pay to my husband A. K. Fitzgerald, the sum of fifty dollars.

And if he, the said W. F. McCulley, does not see proper to pay my said husband A. K. Fitzgerald the fifty dollars above mentioned then and in that event, I give, grant and bequeath said interest or share heretofore granted to my sister the said Lucy McCulley and her heirs, to my husband A. K. Fitzgerald during his life time, and then to said sister Lucy.

3rd I give grant and bequeath to my said sister Lucy McCulley, all my wearing apparel.

I, William R. Anderson, a citizen of Sullivan County, Tennessee, being of sound mind and disposing memory do make, ordain and publish this as my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all other will heretofore made by me.

First. It is my will and desire, and I so direct, after all my just debts and funeral expenses are paid, that all my personal estate of every description (after excluding the gray horse which is the individual property of my son Robert J. Anderson, also one bed and bed-clothing, three quilts, three counterpane, three blankets, and a lot of table ware which is the property of my daughter, Mary A. Anderson) be divided equally between my said son Robert J. Anderson, and my ^{said} daughter Mary A. Anderson.

I am prompted to make the above disposition of my personal estate as a matter of justice to my said son and daughter, they having remained with me at my home, providing, caring for and looking after my comfort in my declining days.

Second. As to my real estate, I make no disposition of that any further than to say that I am indebted to my son, William J. Anderson, in the sum of one hundred and fifty two dollars and fifty cents (\$152.50), he having contributed that amount in paying off some of the heirs of my brother Audley

Anderson, deceased to wit: Lizzie and Maggie Anderson.
I hereby nominate and appoint my Brother-in-law Ed. Smith, to execute this my last will and testament, and excuse him from giving the customary bond.

K. Ford's land on the East and South, by Eliza Douglas and on the West by Precilla Ford's land, and contains 10 acres also in other tracks of land lying on Baker Hill which is bounded on the North and East by M. P. Goadley's heirs and on the South and West by H. K. Ford's land containing 1 acre also a third piece of land

lying on the Goadley's Ferry road in County and State aforesaid and is bounded on the North, East and South by the lands of Eliza Douglas West by James Chatman's land and contains 2 acres more or less, to have and to hold for her support, should it become necessary, she can sell it for her support having a perfect right to make a title to said land.
2 At the death of my dear wife Augusta Ford all my property both personal and real estate shall fall to the part of my son Richard Ford
I hereby appoint my dear friends, Jacob Isenberg and Artie Isenberg executors of this my last will and Testament
