

Last Will & Testament of Robert March Tenn 1906

Mary P. Hamilton, decd. Feb. 8, 1906.

This my last will and testament.

I have paid Mrs. Hicks \$100 a week and it is my will that she have my machine and sofa, walnut bed and part of dishes, Cam. Bottom Chair and rocker, Center table, two of best mitts and pictures all except Mr. Hamiltons and mine, on face leaf table, extra for her precious kindness, at my death also I want her to have my large mirror and Carpet.

It is my will that Mrs. Julia Fleenor have my spary feather bed and straw tick and one half of bed clothes and bedstead I use, one face leaf table, Case upon clock, and Chickens. I want Fizzie Fleenor to have my glass Custard bowl and Johnnie have my new silver butter knife.

It is my will that Rosa Bush have my spary bedstead, the feather bed and straw tick that I use, and the other half my bed clothes, side board, Cherry safe, part of dishes, dining table, two linen table clothes.

It is my will that Sime Smith have my glass butter dish.

It is my will that Bob and Emma Smith have my brass kettle, glass glass Carston.

It is my will that Sime and Emma Smith dispose of my farm and effects as they see proper, all not specified above.

Last Will & Testament of Robert March Tenn 1906

William A. Hard, decd.

I, William A. Hard, considering the uncertainty of life, do make this my last will and testament hereby revoking all former wills by me at any time made.

I. I desire that my body may be decently buried without needless expense in a manner commensurate

to my estate and situation in life.

2. I own no debts of any character and it is my purpose to pay all future debts as they are contracted; so there will be no debts for which I need make provision in this last disposition of my estate.

3. I make the following provisions for my blood children. I give and devise to my son David H. Hard the farm whereon he now lives, known as the Darden White farm, the same being situated in Washington County, Tennessee, and containing 216 acres more or less.

4. I give and devise to my daughter Rebecca E. Riley the farm whereon she now lives known as the Nassum farm, the same being in three tracts and situated in the 16th Civil district of Sullivan County, Tenn., all together containing 256 acres, to the same more or less.

5. I give and devise to my daughter Eliza Alice Berghel the farm whereon she now lives, situated in Washington County, Tennessee known as the Green farm, containing 138 1/2 acres more or less.

6. I give and devise to my daughter Annie D. Swelling the old homestead farm whereon I now live, containing 135 acres more or less, and likewise I give and devise to her the 100-acre tract adjoining the old homestead tract known as the Bickley farm.

7. I give and bequeath to my daughter Amanda E. Potts \$1500.00 in cash in addition to what I have heretofore given her.

8. I give and bequeath unto my three grandsons, Le. E. Gisler, My. Gisler and Clarence Gisler, they being the sons of my daughter Mary C. Gisler, \$500.00 each in addition to what I have heretofore given them.

9. I give and devise unto my three grandsons and grand-daughter James B. Hard, Alice E. Hard, B. D. Hard and R. M. Hard, all sons & daughter of David Hard the farm known as the Plevis farm, containing 62 acres and adjoining the D. H. Speckhaver farm and the John Potts farm, if I should not have disposed of the same during my life time.

10. I further will and bequeath unto my daughter Annie D. Swelling, all farming implements, stocks, horses, cattle, crops, and other personal property not including money, notes, accounts, and other choses in action, which may be on my homestead
